Esqueusing Township Assessment \$8,294,214; 20 Per Cent Jump

Esqueusing Township has been completely reassessed under the Department of Municipal Affairs and the reassessment has jumped the township's total to \$1,370,423, assessor A. W. Benton informed council, Monday, October 16.

He explained the new total assessment was a record \$8,294,214, representing a 20 per cent increase over last year. To date seven landowners have appealed assessments, including Milton Brick Co. Ltd. which saw a 50 per cent increase in their industrial property assessment near Milton.

The township council approved a by-law limiting the building permit fee to a maximum of \$50. Fees are still on a sliding scale, but this by-law is the first limit to be set.

Council took no immediate action on a letter from Acton enquiring about rates of pay for municipal councillors.

Nominations will be the next big event in town on Thursday, November 23, and it is hoped a large crowd will be out to exercise their opinion and let their names stand for office.
