Canada has a great potential as a Christian nation and Canadians are mainly friendly, peaceful, God-fearing, law-abiding people, but is our way of life changing?
This was one of the challenging questions raised by the Hon. John Root (M.P.P., Wellington) here October 25th during his address on "Canada and the Church," at Acton Baptist Church.
Mr. Root was guest speaker at a special service marking Baptist Men's Sunday conducted by men of the local congregation. George Harrop, the church moderator presided and introduced Mr. Root. The scripture lesson and a pastoral prayer were read by Colin Baille and Loyal McCutcheon, both deacons of the church. 1,656 New Phone Books Slated for Acton Users

Telephone numbers by the booklet will soon be on their way to homes and offices in and around Acton. What's more, all the numbers for Acton telephone users are brand new.
C. S. Keith, Bell Telephone manager for this region, said this week that about 115,450 copies of the 1961 directory will be distributed throughout the area served by the directory. Telephone users in Acton will receive 1,656 copies of the new telephone book.
December Dial Service
"You should start using your new directory as soon as you receive it for calls to places other than Acton," Mr. Keith said. The numbers listed for Acton will not go into use until the change to dial service December 17.
In addition to the new numbers for Acton, the 1961 directory also contains seven-figure numbers for Hespeler, Rockwood and Sherwood 2 customers in Kitchener-Waterloo.
"It is important to recognize that these Rockwood, Hespeler and Kitchener-Waterloo numbers have not been changed," Mr. Keith said. "These seven-figure numbers are basically the same numbers as appeared in last year's directory. The only difference is that the letters have been replaced by the corresponding figures on the dial."
Common System
Most telephone companies in North America are adopting the seven-figure numbering system. By changing to it, many millions of additional telephone numbers will be made available in Canada and the United States—enough, in fact, to meet the predicted growth in telephone service on this continent until the year 2000.
A feature of the front cover of the new directory is a sketch of the University of Waterloo. This drawing replaces the illustration of the caged bridge at West Montrose which appeared on last year's cover.
The Galt - Guelph - Kitchener - Waterloo directory also serves Elmira, Elora, Arthur, Fergus, Ayr, Hespeler, New Hamburg and Preston.
