Work Continues This week, the "boards" at the east end of the arena are being installed and the ice surface lev elled with the final layer of sand. J. H. Lock and Co. will return next week and begin the laying of the eight miles of pipe on, the ice surface. The ice making equipment has been installed and the installation of the equipment completed

On the new Community Centre building at the west end of the arena, the block work has been completed on the slower level. Last Eriday, steel 'crection crews moved in and installed the steel girders to support the first floor.

To Pour Cement This week, workmen have installed the metal sheeting on the floor and the wire reinforcing. Pouring of the cement will be fininished today and block work will

continue. Block work on the next level will follow. The steel guiders for the roof are on the site and it is expected rooting will immediately follow the completion of the block work. The plumbing and heating contractors are working at the project and the roughing-

ing work is in progress. Council has the formation of an operating committee under consideration with the completion of the building in late December. Councillors teel it is imperative that the administrative body be organized so that a full season's use of the centre can be realized .

Work parties of volunteers are being organized to paint the inside of the arena and anyone interested in lending a hand can contact Mayor John Goy.
