Spine Affects Body Health Chiropractor Tells Y's Men

"Look well to the spine for disease." This quotation by Hippocrates was used as an admonition to the local Y's Men in the opening words of an address given to them at their regular meeting on October 26 by David Golin D.C. Man is born with natural immunity against certain diseases. The nervous system is connected through the spine to the brain any misalignment of the spine affects the nervous system and the health of the body, they were told.

The speaker outlined the history of Chiropractic in Ontario informing his audience that the first chiropractor came to Ontario in the year 1902. Until comparatively recent years training had to be gained in the United States. With the opening of the Ontario Chiropractic College in Toronto students are now able to acquire the knowledge of Chiropractic without leaving Canada, and can now graduate with the degree of Doctor of Chiropractic after a prolonged period of study and instruction lasting 432 hours. A chiropractic graduate must pass 14 examinations set by the examining board of the Province of Ontario, before being allowed to practise in Ontario.

The speaker was introduced by Y's Man Art Cooper and thanked by Y's Man Bill MacKay.
