

# Public Reaction Shows Progress Sunshine Pupils Now Accepted

In the welcoming address to the parents and friends at the meeting of North Halton Association for Retarded Children, Thursday, October 12th, Mrs. E. Ellenton, president, sketched the progress made by the association since its commencement. Some aspects of growth mentioned by Mrs. Ellenton were enrollment. Once at three pupils, it now stands at 15. With this increase in enrollment, accommodation is a major problem and the only hope lies with past and forth-coming fund raising campaigns in order that the new school will become a reality in the near future.

The staff now consists of a principal, a day teacher, physiotherapy teacher once a month, music and movement instructor, weekly pianist and just recently an art teacher, who has made his services available to the school and a sewing instructor. There has been an enormous increase in transportation, which is proving to be the greatest financial burden in the school's running expenses.

Individual Reports  
The guest speaker of the evening was Mrs. R. P. E. Jeffares, principal of the Sunshine School. To the delight of the parents attending, Mrs. Jeffares gave a report on each individual pupil. It is true to say, also, that non-parents are just as much interested in these reports as were the parents because Mrs. Jeffares is a vital speaker and a truly dedicated person.

Several amusing incidents were related by Mrs. Jeffares and it would seem that great progress has been made by the pupils in the past year, which for a few was their first. It would seem, also, that the general public have progressed in the past year in that they are more aware of the needs and problems of the retarded child. Mrs. Jeffares reported that as little as a year ago, people looked away when their group approached, now the children are acknowledged. This fact is attributed to local newspaper reports and tall fair exhibitions.

These children have great compassion for others less fortunate than themselves. It was reported, and this is encouraged by Mrs. Jeffares and Mrs. Jean Mitchell, the other day teacher, by having a dolly Red Cross Circle when each child contributes a penny or so. This money is given to the Red Cross to aid flood victims, the hungry etc.

It is important that failures should never be mentioned to these children, always placing emphasis on success. Informed Mrs. Jeffares, most children never get beyond grade one or two but this is of no importance as long as they are happy and become useful members of society. It would appear that with the love and individual attention which is in obvious abundance at the Sunshine School, the pupils are assured a bright future.
