Burlington Worker Heads Halton Conservative Assn.

Peter Tully of Burlington, an active worker in Halton Progressive Conservative circles, is the new president of the Halton association.

He was chosen by nearly 400 delegates at the annual meeting and dinner in the Grant Inn, Burlington, Tuesday evening. Mr. Tully succeeds Glen Cooper of Trafalgar, who has been president for the past two years.

Others chosen were vice-president John Dopey of Oakville, ladies' vice-president Mrs. Barbara Cooper of Trafalgar, secretary A. J. "Bud" Nichols of Milton, treasurer George Kerr of Burlington, Young P.C. representative Jack McQuaid of Burlington, and auditors Mac Sproul and Tom Watson of Acton.

Good Man
Federal Minister of Trade and Commerce George Hees was guest speaker, and praised the work of Sandy Best, Halton M.P., in the House of Commons. Mr. Hees termed Sandy "one of the most brilliant, energetic, hardworking, diligent, conscientious young members of Parliament" and urged the Halton party to support Sandy and Provincial M.P. Stan Hall in the coming elections. Mr. Hees discussed Canada's attitude toward Great Britain joining the Common Market, and stated Canada was in agreement as long as her present trading arrangements are safeguarded. However this will be difficult, he noted, because about one-fifth of Canada's export trade goes to the

Great Britain market, 95 per cent of it free of duty.

Canada is profiting her trade by "fighting tooth and nail for every market in every corner of the world" by giving credit terms and giving the country's producers insurance on shipped goods, he assured the gathering.

Sandy Best, who introduced the guest speaker, noted a large increase in the number of polling subdivisions in the county, and urged the delegates to work hard for the P.C. candidates in the next elections.

Provincial member Stan Hall

predicted both federal and provincial elections within the next two years, and asked his listeners to "get out and push" to keep the Conservative party out in front of the field.

The retiring executive reported holding six meetings throughout the past year. The association

mourned the recent passing of two hardworking members, Dick Bird of Burlington and Bruce Fitzgerald of Milton.

Treasurer George Kerr reported a bank balance of \$4.94.
