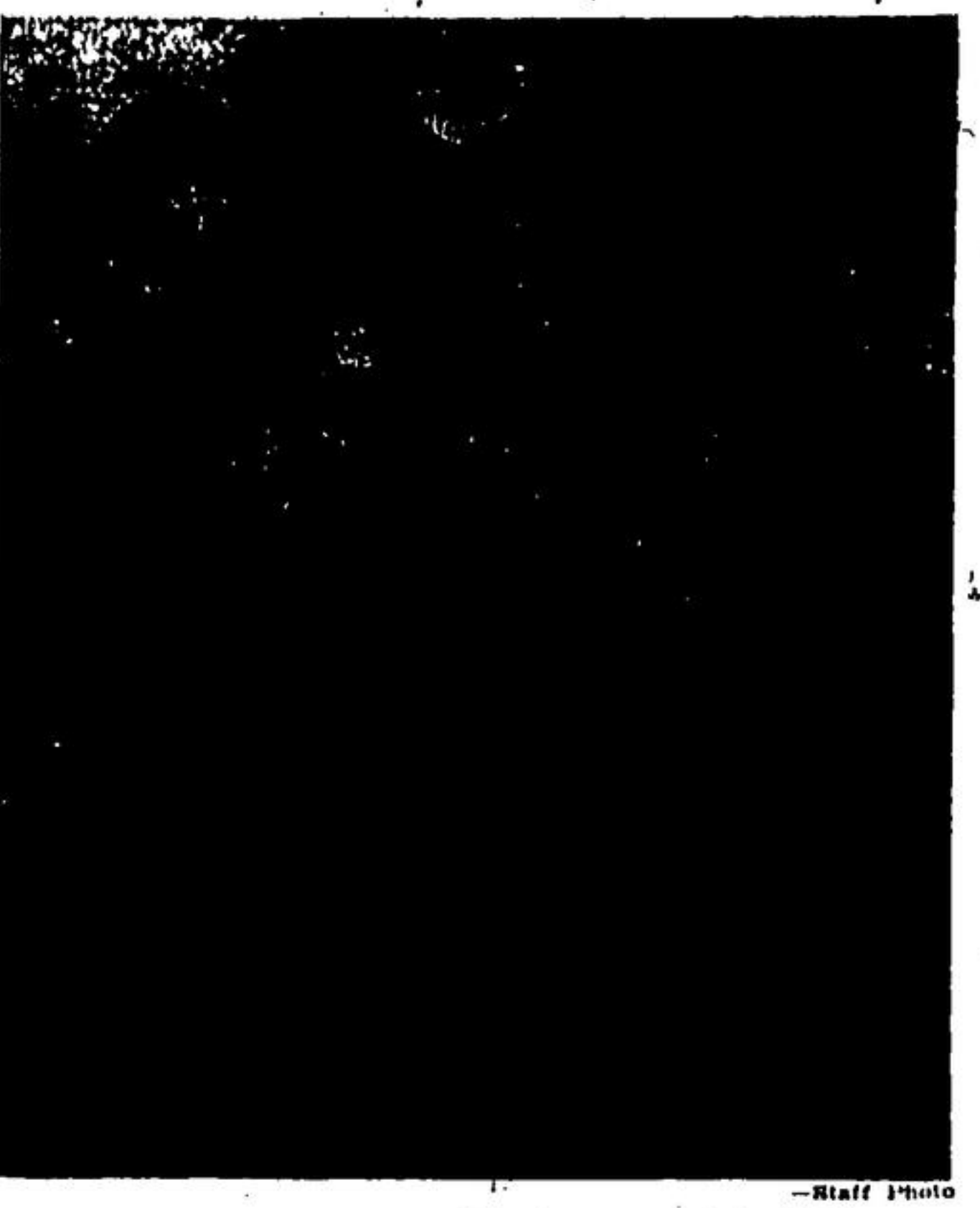

Esqueusing Township Council may end the year with a surplus. Councilors were informed at the regular meeting Monday. Auditors Lever and Hoskin told council that if expenditures were carefully watched until the end of the year, there would be a \$2,800 surplus.

Council granted \$100 to the Glen Williams softball club, which won the Halton County championship. A delegation from the club announced the club had spent a lot of money repairing the Glen ball park and installing lights.

Revise Fees
The fees for building permits were revised to a \$5 charge for the first \$1,000 of construction and \$1 charge per \$1,000 construction after that. Building Inspector William Halls complained that a recent amendment placing a \$50 limit on the permits was penalizing the small construction jobs and giving large projects a break.
