Hear Cancer Drive Over Top Smoking Film Goes to H.S.

North Halton Cancer Society's campaign to raise \$6,000 for cancer research exceeded the mark by \$176.75 with Acton Branch raising \$1,292 of the grand total. This information was announced during the annual meeting of the North Halton Society, held in the Rose Room at the Georgetown arena, Thursday, November 16.

Acton representatives included Mr. and Mrs. Harold Denny and Mrs. Arthur Ford. Mr. Denny gave the report of the Acton Branch and informed the meeting of the progress being made at the local branch.

Georgetown hosted the meeting and the 60 representatives and guests enjoyed hearing a talk by Mrs. V. N. Minns, chairman of the Maplewood district unit. She outlined ways and means of improving the organization.
