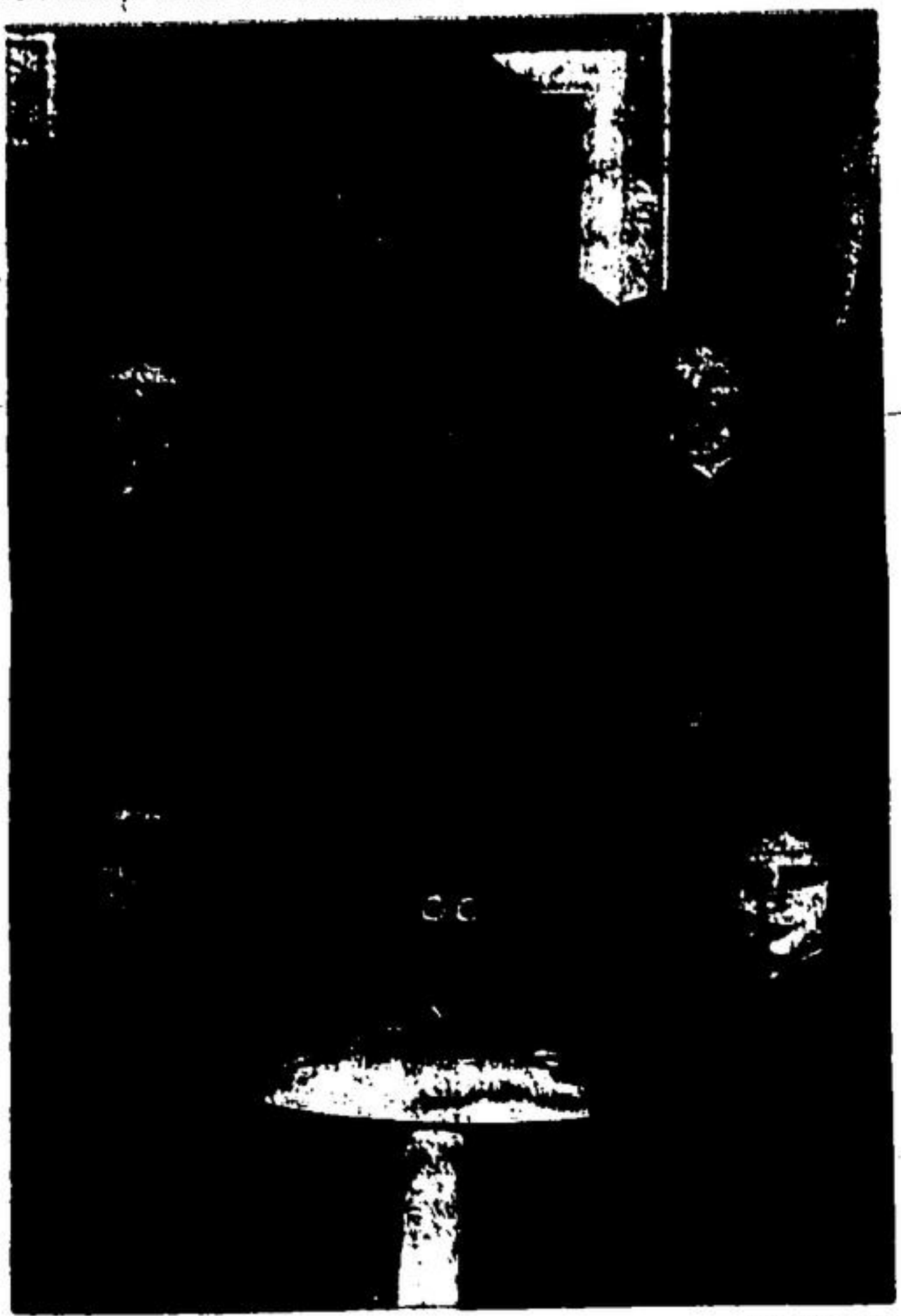
There will be a party for the Minstrel Show cast and staff and their guests after the last performance of their three night stand Saturday evening in the school.

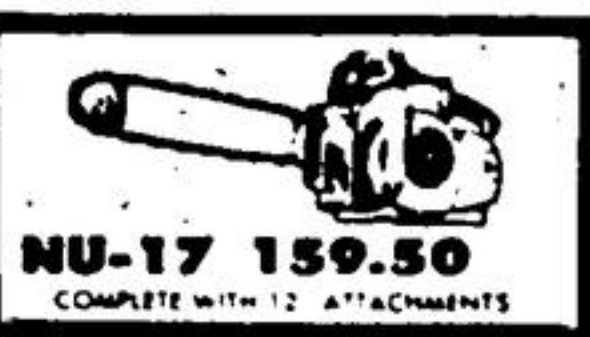
