Acclamation in Esquering 120 Pack Hall on Monday

In spite of a steady snowfall and icing roads, a crowd of 120 ratepayers jammed Stewarttown Hall Monday evening to attend the township of Esquering nomination meeting. There will not be an election this year, as all offices were filled by acclamation.

Nominations began at 7:30 but not until the first name was placed on the blackboard at the front of the room at 8:10 p.m. did the crowd stir and voices buzz. Nominators then hastily began sponsoring more candidates for the positions of reeve, deputy-reeve, three councillors and three school board trustees.

Two Drop Out
Wilfrid Bird received the office of reeve by acclamation, and George Leslie was acclaimed deputy-reeve when only their names were proposed. Both are veterans in township politics.

For three positions on council, those nominated were Walter Linham, Walter Pope, George Currie and Wilfred Leslie. Before the meeting ended, Mr. Pope dropped out of the race, allowing the other three an acclamation.

Three positions were open for school board and those nominated were R. J. Cunningham, Mac Sprowl, Albert Hunter and William Lawson. Mr. Hunter declined to run for election and the others are trustees by acclamation.

Township clerk K. C. Lindsay was named chairman for the general meeting following nominations and called on the retiring reeve, Cam Sinclair and committee chairman for their reports.

Time for Change
Mr. Sinclair thanked the ratepayers and fellow councillors for their assistance during the past year. In stepping out of municipal politics, Mr. Sinclair told the ratepayers, "After five years at county council, I feel the end of the road has come for me and it is time for someone new to become interested."

The retiring reeve gave reports on county council committees and told the audience that Esquering council the past year had started a sinking fund by altering one mill of taxes for this purpose. He stated his anticipation that future councils would continue this practice in order to be prepared for any emergencies. He informed the crowd that council anticipated building a new municipal hall, has studied several sites, but has not reached any final decision.

Highest Assessment
Reeve-elect Wilfrid Bird thanked the ratepayers for acclaiming him to office and stated that although Halton is the second smallest county in Ontario, it has the highest population, and possibly will have the highest assessment. He also reviewed the county council committees he is a member of and said he was in favor of the new county administration building being erected.

In reviewing his participation on county council's Emergency Measures Organization committee, Mr. Bird said he had attended a three-day course at Arnprior. The course had been quite educational and although he personally didn't intend to erect a fallout shelter, he had returned with plenty of literature available for anyone interested.

Consider Zoning
Deputy-reeve-elect George Leslie reviewed the road committee activities during the past year and warned the ratepayers council would have to consider zoning in certain parts of the township in order to control a possible boom.

He also noted his agreement with the erection of a new municipal hall as he pointed out the present crowded conditions. He noted the need for a new building a few years ago and stated, "Council has been kind

of slow to erect a new hall, but we didn't like to raise the taxes for this purpose. Now the time has come and a new hall is evident."

Present councillors were given an opportunity of reporting on last year's activities.

One School Area
Clarence Coles, school board chairman who is dropping out this year, told the ratepayers he was pleased to see the entire township in one school board area and said, "This is a real step forward and I hope in time everyone will agree with this move."

He reviewed the anticipated building program and outlined the proposed school at Lime house and another in the Hornby area. He congratulated council on their consideration in keeping the roads in good condition for the safety of school children travelling by bus to school.

Tustee R. J. Cunningham reviewed the financial report for the school board and informed ratepayers, it was his opinion the board is not making as much use of government grants as they might. He also reviewed the anticipated school expansion and stated, "I am opposed to auditoriums in our schools as I do not believe the municipality is able to pay for such a luxury."

Sprowl Has Hopes
Mac Sprowl, property chairman of the board, told his audience that a need for additional school expansion must be established before the project is undertaken and stated that the
