

Shielding The most effective -protection

is to place some heavy material and have a battery-powered between yourself and the fall radio. out. The heavier the material, the better the protection. Fallout shelters such as that recommended in Blueprint for Survival No. 1, are the best, but fairly effective shelters can be built from many common materials other than those mentioned.

I negotiated a contract for badly-needed additional cemetery land (approximately four and a half acres) at a price of \$4,000 instead of previous quoted prices of \$16,000 to \$20,000 and at the same time this purchase eliminated a registered plan of subdivision which could have been very costly to Acton. -As your county representative, [1] I have argued for reduction of excessive county

grants to hospitals, (2) have taken a fair and
