 W. E. Barnett, architect, was present during the first portion of the meeting to outline sketch plans for the proposed four-room addition and discussed costs with the board. He was informed that following a decision by the board, he would be advised.

**Change Bus Routes**  
 During the meeting members learned the school bus routes had been adjusted to include picking up some students who had to walk over two miles to catch the bus. The change in the routes will mean that the bus travels an additional 16 miles each day.  
 A letter of appreciation was received from top grade 13 graduating student, Doreen Gordon, who thanked the board for the plaque and scholarship she had received during the graduation exercises. Board members also learned that Mrs. Keith Martin had been engaged as part time secretary in the office.

A request was received from the Secondary School Teachers Federation asking the board to ACTON 11007 Vellah 1 on an air 6000 school addition saving dependently the Board of Regional officers of any incompetence in the teaching staff. It was pointed out that during the past year, 32 cases of alleged incompetence and three others had been investigated. The board was advised that this screening program prevented incompetent teachers from obtaining documents approving their abilities.

Trustee Rev. Dwight Engel told his colleagues he had advocated last year the board should have a committee to interview prospective teachers and stressed the importance of having such a committee.

**Review Boundaries?**  
 Esquimes representative on the board, trustee Wallace Swackhamer, urged members to re-evaluate the school area boundaries and cited cases where students living within a short distance of Georgetown were included in the Acton area. Board members agreed to request county council to review this situation.

The board approved purchase of new drapes for the geography room and rubber mats for the shower room. Accounts totalling \$12,495.69 were approved for payment.

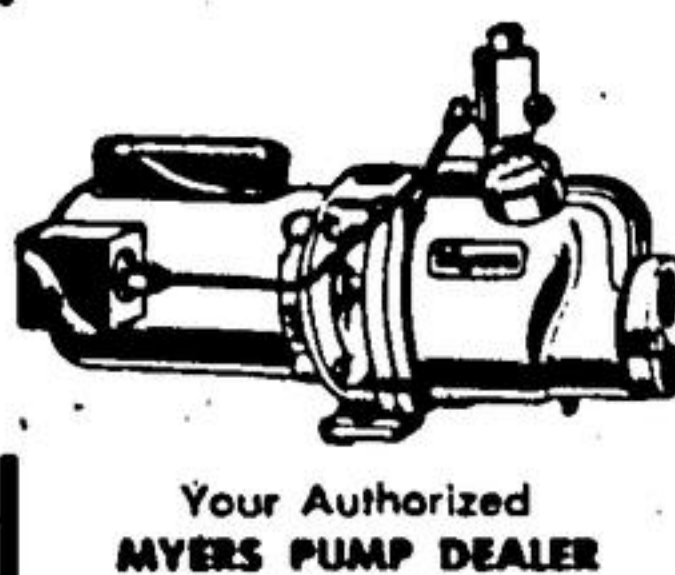
