Continued from Page One position after you have turned it around to the finger stop. That's why it is so important that you let it ride back by itself - not forcing it. As the dial rotates back, there is a click for each unit of the digit you dialed -three clicks for the figure foun clicks for the figure 4, and so on. Each click sends a pulse of electric current to the mechanism in the central office. The mechanism then proceeds to put the call through for you. Each action is simple, but the overall effect is a complicated onethat is, getting your call through to the one telephone out of the millions throughout the world that you want to reach.

"The coming of the dial telephone is a very important step of Acton, but it is certainly not the final one. Starting Sunday. we'll be able to dial our own local calls. In a few years, we'll be able to start dialing our long distance calls.

"The dial central office, which we know today, will be succeeded by whaf is called an electronic central office. Such of fices are already in use on a trial basis. They don't simply connect calls, but also do many other things.
