Fire Phone, Rings False Alarms

On the first day of dial phoning the number which is dialed only to report a fire was called in eight times. By Monday the total of calls which had not been successfully intercepted, might have caused the siren to sound a false alarm twice to 12.

Sunday afternoon the fire chief's special fire phone rang nine times when other numbers were supposed to be called. By Monday noon the chief had received three additional calls meant for other numbers.

It is believed that people using the dial system are looking up at the stick which lists the fire call number for emergency use placed on their phones.
