Nuclear attacks on centres of production and conditions fallout may curtail the distri bution of available food stocks until several days or even weeks following these attacks. Persons who had taken shelter might be

advised to stey in their shelters for as long as 14 days. Those who had chosen to evacuate likely target areas would be dependent on available food resources in the reception towns.
