

Commissioners Sharpen Pencils To Finalize 1962 Capital Budget

Hydro commissioners burned the midnight oil Thursday, January 25 in an attempt to pare anticipated capital budget expenditures for 1962 and reach some conclusion on adjusting the power load on number one substation.

Commissioners sharpened their pencils when the capital budget program was submitted by superintendent Doug Mason and after careful review approved an estimated budget amounting to \$9,254,911. Of this amount the bulk will be used for the purchase of new transformers estimated at \$2,000,000; meters, \$1,500 and street lighting estimated at \$2,000. The bulk of the balance will be used up in regular maintenance.

Following the report during the last meeting when the superintendent submitted prices for changing transformers at number one substation from 25 cycle to 60 cycle, in order to carry a greater power load, a review took place Thursday evening. In conclusion the secretary was advised to contact Ontario Hydro to have a representative present at the next meeting to discuss the situation. Meanwhile the superintendent was instructed to obtain additional prices for rewinding the transformers.

No Hot Water

During the meeting commissioners reviewed a recent survey taken by meter reader Newt Hurst which showed that 57 hydro customers were without hot water because of any description. Of the total number of customers 1,107 had water heaters either on flat rate or non-flat rate.

Superintendent Doug Mason was authorized to attend a supervisory Safety meeting in Toronto January 29-30. Accounts totalling \$18,129.44 were approved for payment.

Commissioners were informed by mayor John H. Goy that council contemplated a street lighting program during this year to include improved lighting on Bower Avenue, an amber crossing light at Ajax Engineering to warn motorists of the railway crossing, luminaire lights at all approaches to town, and additional lighting at the park entrance. He requested the superintendent to estimate approximate costs of these projects for council's approval.
