Halton, Peel Trust Reports Profits Up

The annual report of Halton and Peel Trust and Savings Company, mailed to shareholders on Thursday, outlined highlights of a successful year at the company offices in Oakville, Burlington and Brampton.

Among the highlights are the following: paid-in capital is \$1,077,690; profits before income taxes \$150,671; income taxes \$62,000; dividends to shareholders \$47,626; savings and term deposits \$15,618,084; first mortgages \$11,509,918; bonds and stocks \$4,505,499; estates, trusts and agencies \$1,053,224; total assets \$17,948,988.

Profits Up
The company reports a 92 per cent increase in net profits before taxes, a 72 per cent increase in bonds and stocks, a 51 per cent increase on savings and term deposits, a 45 per cent rise in total assets and a 35 per cent increase in mortgages.

President O. E. Manning explains a new branch is opening at Simcoe in March, and the new head office building at Oakville will be ready in May. Larger premises are now being occupied by the offices in Brampton and Burlington.

—Noticed how pretty the Valentines are this year? With good luck you won't get one single nasty one.

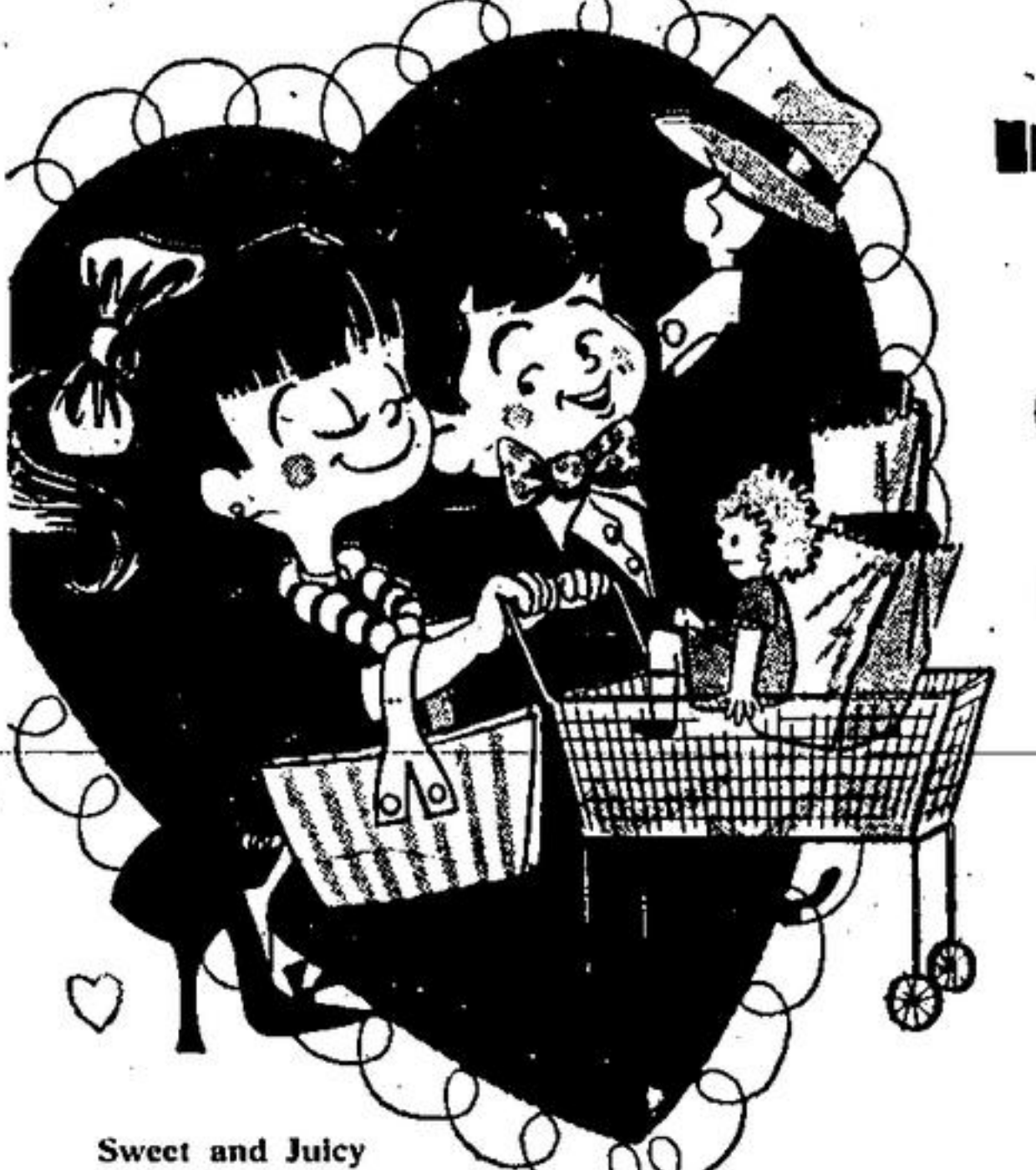
