LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Proper Foundation for Better Communications — Chairman

145 Church St., Acton, Acton Free Press, Acton, Ont. Dear Mr. Editor:

You recently printed a letter to the Editor from Mrs. G. Robertson which, I think, was particularly timely.

Agent the bouquet Mrs. Robertson passed to the Chairman of the Acton District High School Board about his concern for English in the High School, regardless of her past professional status, and therefore, possible prejudice, she is a district resident mother, also a district taxpayer. I believe that she speaks from a widespread concern for educational standards today, particularly for that basic department of education in this country: ENGLISH.

Without a sound foundation of learning and using English, the superstructure of education is limited in its use by the failure of proper communications among people, and then, countries.

The writer was privileged to attend part of an educational conference organized by the professional development branch of the Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation in the beautiful Composite High School in Brampton on Friday, February 23rd.

It appeared to the writer that the actual teaching job is, generally, in very competent hands—but—there is, seemingly, some confusion in Department of Education directorship and policy development.

The very able Chairman, Mr. McKenzie, Principal of the new Brampton High School, quoted some eminent authority to the effect that "One man in a hundred is destined to leadership of men; the other ninety-nine follow women." This is a modern adaptation of older observations such as: "It is only the large, strong fish that swim upstream, the rest go with the current and eventually end up at sea."

This present day percentage, here expressed, seems unduly high and could reflect a school program and curriculum that fails to encourage sufficient personal individuality.

The first speaker, a professional director of education from the Ontario Department of Education seemed to express, to the writer, a somewhat confused effort by the Department, at least in part, to follow public opinion.
