Government Assists Coming Centennial

Information about Canada's centennial in 1967 has been sent to Mayor John Goy.

Various municipalities will be planning local projects and events during that year, and the Federal Government is now organized and co-ordinating such activities. Federal funds are available for certain projects, particularly those of a lasting and permanent nature, and each province has a co-ordinator through which these projects are correlated.

A Federal Commissioner will soon be appointed to head up the Government's plans for 1967.

In September 1961, the Canadian Centennial Act was passed by the House of Commons, and a copy of this, together with other information has been sent to the mayors of Halton County.

Winter Work

The section at the arena which housed the booth and former curling rink waiting room is being demolished this week under the winter works program.

Local workmen began Wednesday morning to tear out the inside of the section. When this is completed the entire structure will be demolished. Steel siding will be added to the side of the arena which will be bared making the entire building uniform.

Close Shave

Tons of Snow Heaved Sunday By Weary Volunteers at Arena

Chips were flying Sunday at the arena as the thickness of ice was reduced with the help of an ice shaver, rented by the arena commission. Volunteers assisted the Oakville operator in keeping the build-up of snow cleared away. Before the project was ended tons of snow were cleared away and dumped outside.

The electrically-operated shaver and operator worked from 10:00 a.m. until evening. Many weary volunteers pushed shovels and scrapers to fill the front end loader owned by the town which in turn dumped the snow outside.

Later in the evening, a crew of volunteers dabbed paint to refurbish the bright red and blue curling and hockey lines. After the job was completed and the paint dry, curlers were on the spot Monday afternoon to test the newly shaved surface.

Reduction of ice thickness results in a more economical operation of the refrigeration plant.

Send New Ballot For Hog Voters

The O.F.P.M.B. mailed new ballots to the 63 who attended the first election, and they were to be used in by 10:30 a.m. today (Thursday).
