Acton Parks Board will ask council for a levy of \$2,685 for operation of parks during 1962. Finalization of the Community Centre budget under the board's jurisdiction was left for the consideration of the budget committee for presentation to council. This action was taken during their Wednesday evening's meeting.

Board members agreed to close down the operation of the ice plant following skating, Saturday, April 14. Bill Coon, representing the Acton Curling Club, was granted permission for use of the arena Wednesday and Thursday, April 4 and 5, in conjunction with the club's bonspiel.

Although final details have not been completed, members were brought up to date on a sports timer for the arena.

It was also learned suggestions had been made to different organizations on possible gifts for the community centre: Legion Auxiliary, drapes for the auditorium, Lakeside Chapter I.O.D.E., a flag and picture of the Queen for the arena area; the Duke of Devonshire Chapter I.O.D.E., a flag and Queen's picture for the auditorium.

Rachlin Trophy Given Friday

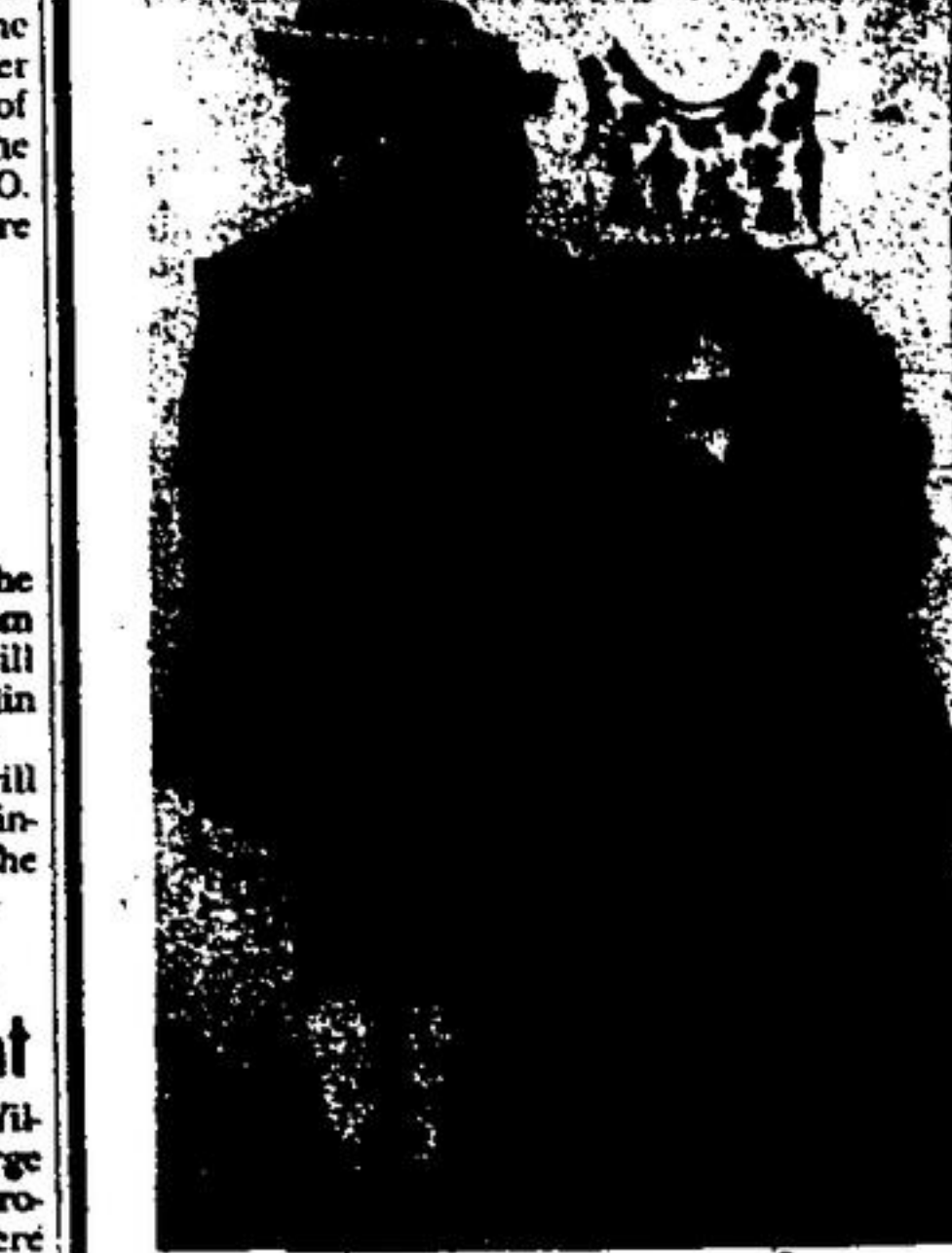
Seven pupils, four from the Robert Little and three from the M. Z. Bennett school, will compete for the B. D. Rachlin public speaking trophy Friday.

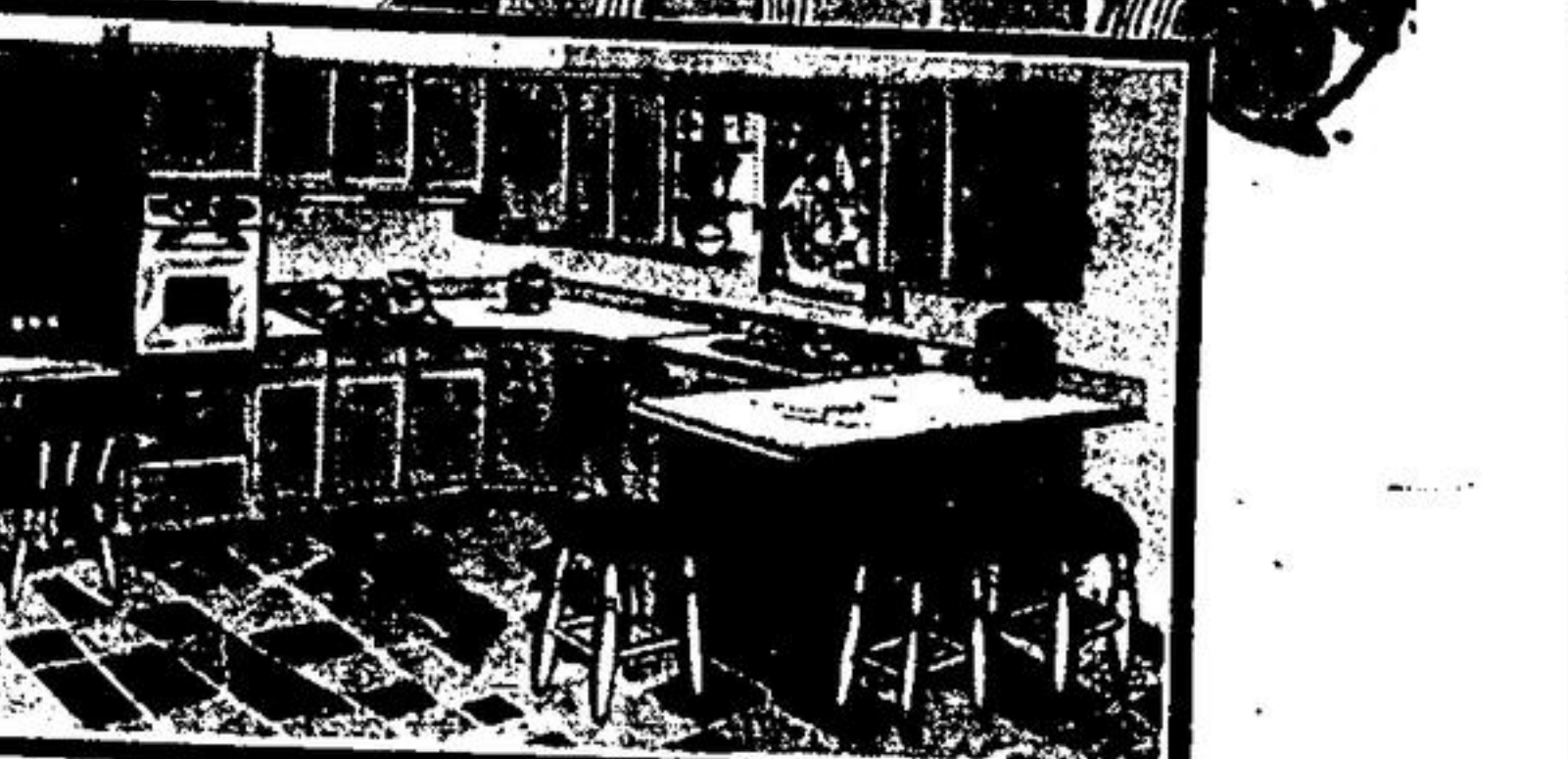
