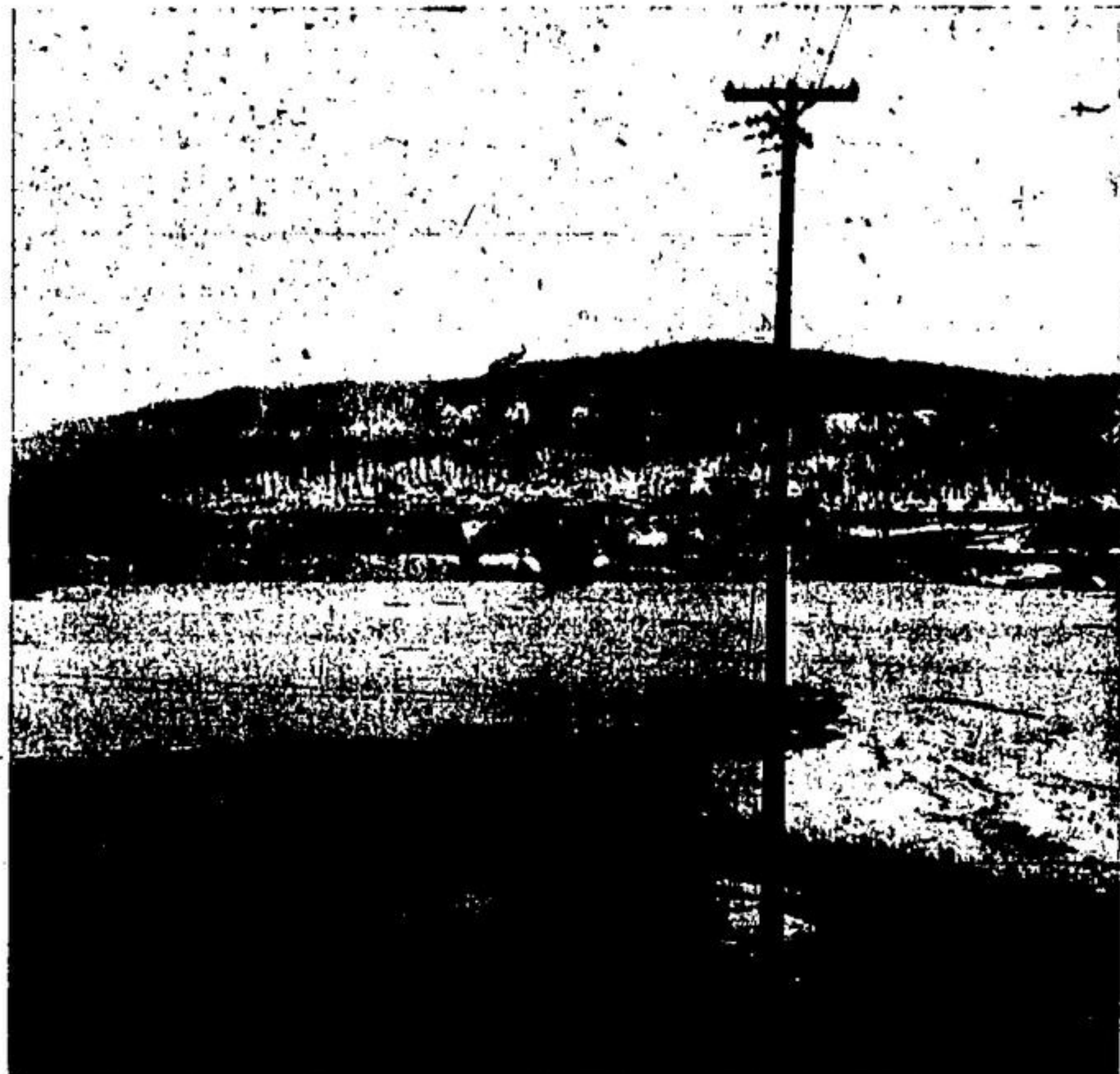

A ROAD DISAPPEARS into the water which has been backed up behind Kelso Dam since the five-foot valve was closed Wednesday of last week. The road will eventually be completely covered when the water reaches its regulated level. Only 48 hours after the valve was closed, the water at the dam was 10 feet in depth. It is roughly 20 feet below what will be its regulated level once flooded conditions have passed. The dam is presently set to store 400 cubic feet a second and discharge 600.
