## New Section Written Into Act To Protect Aged Home Residents

Halton County's attempt to get a private bill approved by the Ontario Legislature has prompted the Department of Welfare to sponsor a new section into the Homes for the Aged Act. The section will allow homes to have residents sign over securities and properties to be managed by the home until the resident leaves, thereby preventing the residents from being "fleeced" out

of their money by friends or relatives. County officials praised the efforts of Halton M.P.P. Stanley L. Hall in helping carry the battle for the delegation from Halton Centennial Manor, Halton Clerk Garfield Brown, who is secretary-treasurer of the Halton Manor Board, said "our purposes would have been defeated had it not been for the terrific job Stan Hall did."

The bill was presented to the Legislature's private bills committee March 1, where it seemingly bogged down under pressure from Toronto M.P.P. Meenan while Mr. Hall, solicitor William Sharpe and Mr. Brown met with the deputy minister of welfare; and as a result, a new section was written into the Homes for the Aged Act. The private bill before the legislature's special committee was then withdrawn Tuesday morning.

The new regulation will have to be passed by parliament, but officials here are sure there will be no trouble in getting it approved. The director of the Homes for the Aged Branch of the Department of Welfare and the Attorney-General have already okayed the move.

Halton's application fee will be refunded, but the hearings will still cost the County some money.

**To Conference**  
This County first tried to stir up some action on the policy in June 1960 when they presented a resolution at the Ontario Association of Homes for the Aged conference at Fort Francis. At that time, the delegates approved the resolution, however the department did nothing until recently after the Halton request for a private bill was publicized.

The new section allows a home to "enter into an agreement with a resident of the home to receive, hold and administer real or personal property in trust."
