### The BIBLE Today



In Guatemala, they need for translations in local dialects as well as in Spanish has been particularly met by the issuing of the New Testament in Kekchi and two Gospel portions in Mam of Huchuetenango as well as a revision of a Quiche Gospel. This brings to ten the number of dialects into which some part of the Scriptures has been translated. Missionary translators are thus providing the tools to bring the story of the Saviour to the very mixed population of the country.

In Peru during the first half of 1961 the circulation of Scriptures totaled 202,264 volumes. First copies of the New Testament in Pilo were received and distributed to the Indians along the banks of the Urubamba River in Eastern Peru. Since many of these people scarcely ever handle money and therefore cannot pay even the subsidized price of 74 cents (publication price of the New Testament \$1.24), copies are presented to all those who can recite, without mistake, fifty verses from memory.
