

Experience with Santa Handling the helicopter

Chief pilot Schultz admitted this was his first experience, at spraying a single tree. He has the dreaded Dutch elm disease. The spray mixture consisted sparved crops and bushes several.

> As the helicopter hovered over the tree, the pilot, allowing for the slight breeze, pressed the control which allowed the D.D.T. to stream\_from the nozzles attached to the control bar.
