New High in Calf Club Try Costly Oat Variety

The offer of two 4-H Agricultural clubs for the Acton area, met an enthusiastic response on Wednesday, April 18, when 28 boys and girls met at Bannockburn School to organize their 4-H clubs and elect executives.

The Acton 4-H Calf Club which last year captured the Halton premier club award for perfect attendance and completion reached a new high in enrolment with 25 members.

Club leader Sandy Buchanan of Moffat, conducted the election of officers during which John Krandonk was chosen president, John brings five years of 4-H experience to the office and is the holder of a certificate of merit award for six projects completed. Murray Wallace was elect-

ed vice-president and secretary will be last year's Calf Club winner, Janet Aitken.

New Variety

The Acton 4-H Grain Club project will introduce to this area the new variety "Russell" oats. Seventeen members received two-bushel lots which they will seed on a one acre plot. Since the cost of this seed is very high, club members will receive financial assistance from the Halton Soil and Crop Improvement Association. The election of officers which was conducted by club leader Fyfe Somerville, resulted in the appointment of Russell Murray as president. Russell is one of the leading 4-H members of the county, also with six projects to his credit. Vice-president

is Grant Van Gils and secretary Frank Anthony, Associate Agricultural representative for Halton. D. J. Burnside distributed project kits and outlined the program which will be carried out during the term of the project.

Splendid Record
Nino Braida, president of the Acton Agricultural Society, welcomed the members on behalf of the directors and urged them to strive to maintain the splendid record set by former Acton 4-H Clubs.
These clubs are sponsored by the Acton Agricultural Society and are organized under the policies of the Ontario Department of Agriculture. Local club leaders will be Fyfe Somerville, Clarence Feenstra, Sandy Buchanan and Nino Braida.

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M.P. Announces Sewage Plant Ford Contract

Two major expenditures by the Federal Government—in Halton County were announced this week by Halton County M.P. Alexander "Sandy" Best.

Mr. Best, speaking from Ottawa, said the Federal Government will contribute \$150,000 toward the cost of construction of a new sewage disposal plant at Burlington to be built at an estimated cost of \$1,830,000.

A Department of Defence Production contract for the building of eight three ton stake trucks has been awarded to the Ford Motor Company of Canada at Oakville in the amount of \$30,349.08, he added.
