—Caretakers at the two public schools and the high school are busy with a general cleanup program during the Easter holiday.

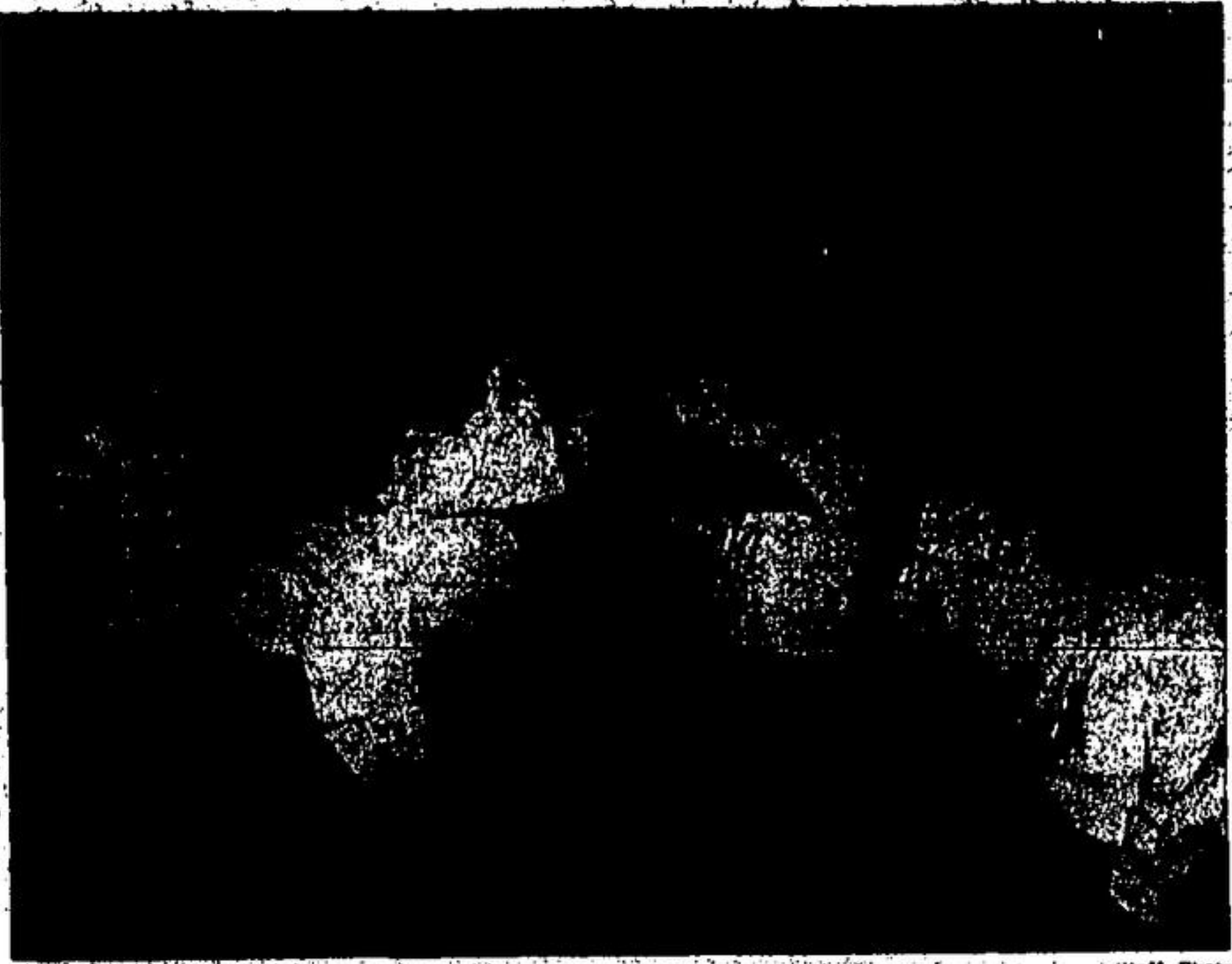
—A neighbor picked her first dandelion of the year and brought it into the Free Press office Wednesday. Went right into a button-hole.
