

Future Cabinet Minister?

Tories Pick Sandy Best Candidate

Labelled as a "young, capable, vigorous, intelligent worker," Charles Alexander "Sandy" Best, 31, was named Friday to carry the Halton Progressive Conservative banner in the June 18 Federal election.

Mr. Best was first elected Halton M.P. at Ottawa in 1957, and in 1958 he won his second landslide victory in Halton.

Mr. C. A. Martin of Milton made the nomination, and it was seconded by Mrs. J. Lehman of Oakville, before a crowd of 250 Conservatives who attended the nomination convention at the Milton Town Hall.

Mr. Best was first elected Halton M.P. at Ottawa in 1957, and in 1958 he won his second landslide victory in Halton.

He spoke of the millions of dollars poured into Halton County in federal public works, including additions to old post offices or erection of new post offices in all Halton centres.

Turning to his opposition, he called the Liberal party the "vanquished pomp of yesterday."

Under a Liberal regime, the dollar slipped down 38 cents in value between 1945 and 1955.

Unemployment, Mr. Walker continued, is not a serious problem. The government is attempting to train the people for skilled jobs to get them back to work.

Other Conservative government accomplishments he listed were an increased import trade, a surplus trade balance of \$89 million last year, lowered income taxes for 85 per cent of the people.
