penditure of \$74,927.64, a deficit of \$4,544.21 on the total cost of the project remains to be paid.

In order to complete our project as a year round recreational centre, we need to pay off our deficit, install a concrete floor in the arena and add some minor finishing touches. Our fund raising committee recommends we "Finish It Now" by continuing our campaign to raise an additional \$10,000.

Accordingly, the Community Centre Committee has decided to raise this money by asking those people who contributed through payroll or bank deductions to continue their pledge for an additional two months. The contributors who gave an outright cash donation would be asked to consider an additional contribution.

To implement this program, the suggestion has been made to recapass the entire town asking for continued support. The date set for these house calls is during the last week in May.

We hope you will be receiving the volunteer canvasser from your neighborhood with the same friendly understanding that he originally received so you can "Finish It Now".
