wumps, who thumped and wumped and wound up with the title. If you're interested in the pinfall, it was Mugwumps 3008 and Hep Cats 2810.

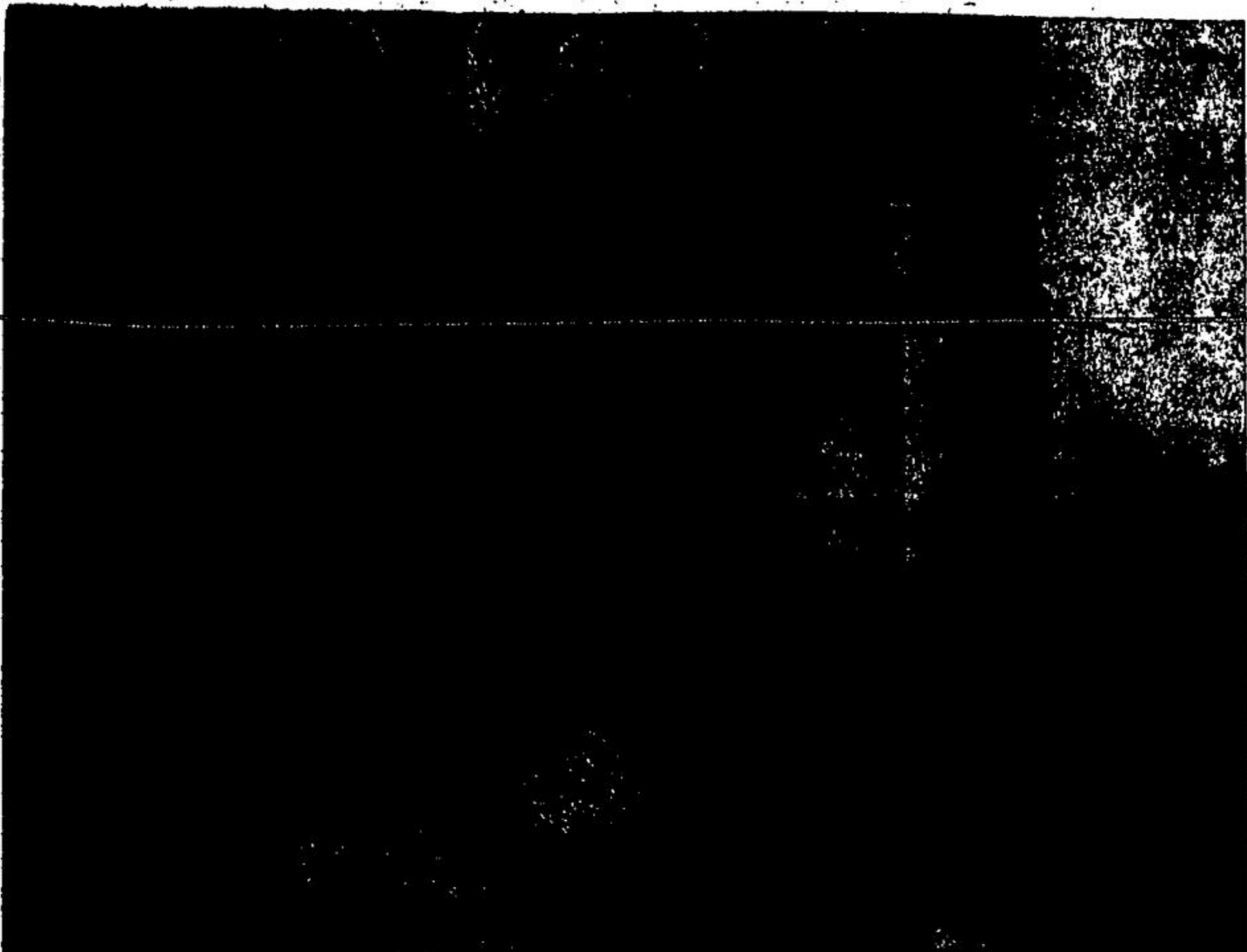
**Blue Springs**
