Mums are in second place, getting there with the singles of Nancy Jensen 224, Adele Nolan 232, Audrey Urquhart 229, Betty Hardie 203, Wilja Hewitt 207. With a pinfall of 2744, Mums have plenty to pick up. Eleanor Goy with 207 and Shirley Hunter with 229 headed up the Roses' roll for a pinfall of 2589. Carnations checked in with a pinfall of 2564, with Wanetta Smith 253 and Millie Stitt 234 grabbing the single honors. With a 621 from Sophie Oehrich to give them a lift, Glad made with a 1908 to take the edge over Asters in the consolation. Beryl Jordana made with a 612 tricont for Asters.

Second Block: May 2: Going into the second three-game block, Violets, who had nearly a 400 point lead, never lost command of the situation and wound up champs of the Blue Spring Nursery league. Violets did not have the big triples of the first three-game block but with Cheryl Phillips posting singles of 241-206, they wound up with a pinfall of 2635, to go with their previous 3141, for a 5776. Mums came closest to giving Violets a run for their money with a total pinfall of 5404, but were still plenty short of taking the crown. Nancy Jensen 200-203, Adele Nolan 216, Audrey Urquhart 225 and Peggy DeBruyn 220 were Mums' sharpshooters. Carnations, with

a pinfall of 2754 paced by Wanetta Smith 610, Jennie Clendenning 207, Agnes McGuinness 207-206, Dot Wilson 223 and Millie Stitt 211-209 were rolling much better than they did in the initial phase, but it came too late. Roses likewise, with a better second night effort of 2766, gave it a try, but Violets' big lead was too much to overcome. Joanne Incoe 668, Eleanor Goy 213, Marg Woodhouse 238, Shirley Hunter 205 and Janice Withers 211 topped the Roses' final effort. Glad's with Sophie Oehrich 667 and Thelma Vale 207, finished out the season with a 2658 pinfall for a total of 4566. This completely swamped Asters' 3720 and Glad's were winners of the consolation.

Micro Plastic

May 1: Rolling three games in the 900 bracket saw Hi Impacts hit a 2815 pinfall total, to leave the rest of the pack behind in the first three-game block of their playoffs. Mary Cooney rolled a 660 tricont with "Boots" Grischow 212, Elsa Macke 221 and Paddy Dick 203 getting the singles. Flexibles tried to catch the Impacts, but wound up with a 2679 pinfall. A few triconts would have helped their cause, but they had to go with the singles—Jim Gibson 238-200 and Fred Mellor 221. Bob Drinkwater with 208-218 and Audrey Grischow with 201 paced the Gents in their 2632 pinfall roll. Puts em in the third slot. Despite a 687 from Leo McGalloway, Bell Rings had trouble ringing up a substantial pinfall and settled for 2464. With Hank Earle spilling the pins for a 705 triple. Scrappers should have had a better pinfall with 2273, but the pins were stubborn for the rest of the Scrappers and the necessary big games were not forthcoming. Die Beaters must be saving their big games for the final three games because they did not chalk 'em up in the first three, their pinfall being a 2370.

Acton Ladies

May 2: It'll be Cameos and McCallum's in the finale of the Acton Ladies' League. McCallum's, with a powerhouse roll of 3089 for three games, paced by Marion Pope 661, Peg Ballentine 608 and Marion Storey 600, along with Rita Dwyer and Pat Frizzell tossing in singles of 257 and 261 in that order, jumped into an
