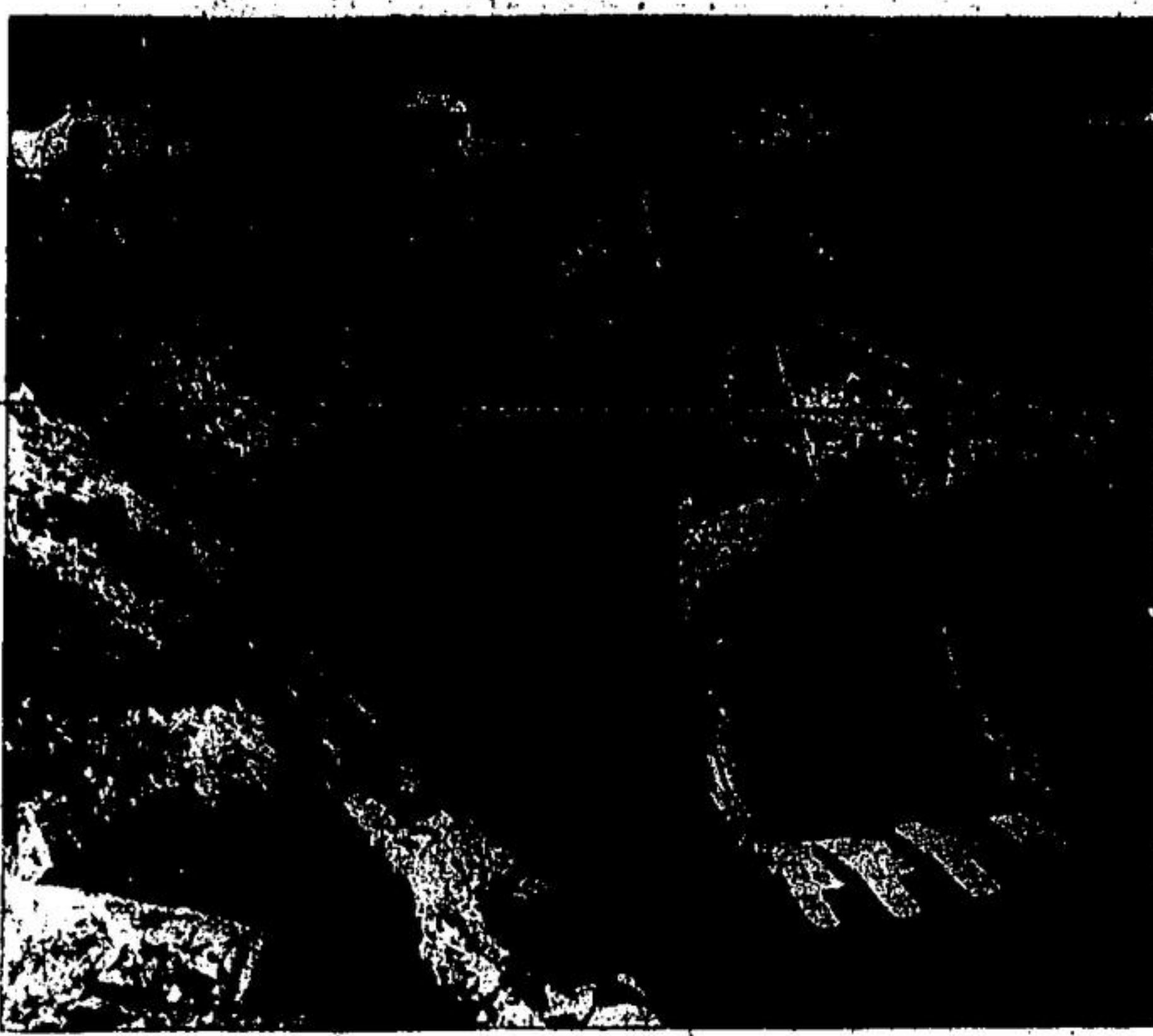

## Let Contract to Boost Capacity at Substation

Acton's No. 1 hydro substation will be increased in capacity by almost 80% when work is completed under a tender awarded last Thursday evening. Jones Swenor Electric Limited was awarded a contract subject to Ontario Hydro approval for \$492,200 to complete the "farm" with supply and install new switch gear at the Wilson Street substation which will handle the additional capacity of the transformers. The transformers will be reconnected by Ontario Hydro for 60 cycle operation and the capacity will be increased from 1500 KVA to 2700 KVA.

During the conversion work Ontario Hydro will supply a mobile transformer installation at a cost of \$25 per day. The Commission required from Ontario Hydro permission for an additional capital expenditure of \$6900 to finance the project.

Svd Lamb and William Denny attended with representatives of their Insurance Companies and presented proposals for Commission Insurance. The companies reviewed the insurance presently carried by the Commission and made recommendations on a complete program of coverage. No rates were submitted by the companies.

Commissioners will study the proposals and when it has been determined the classes and amounts of insurance required, tenders will be called. Some of the present insurance expires at the end of 1962. Accounts amounting to \$1240.85 were approved for payment.

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
