\$1,685,000. Quarry For Dolly Varden

Last week's publication of the Free Press carried a feature story regarding Acton Quarries Limited being established at the former lime kilns at Dolly Varden. On Friday, the Toronto Globe and Mail carried a brief news item regarding the operation.

In the Globe, it was stated the automated \$1,685,000 limestone treatment plant was expected to be in operation by October. It was also stated that an estimated 40,000,000 tons of limestone were outlined by diamond drilling and Frederick G. Gardiner, former chairman of Metropolitan Toronto, was president of the company.


Many favorable comments were received by the writer of last week's feature story but evervone wished to know if official information regarding the quarhad been received. The only reply available was that Frederick G, Gardiner had been named president and he had promised a news release, but to date, none has been received.

It was learned this week the company required a 27,000 volt power line for its operation and hydro officials were seeking permission from Acton council to run the line down Churchill Road south to the quarry. Hydro representatives were to appear at council on Tuesday but failed to put in an appearance.
