**Museum, Castle, Parliament For Speyside School Trip**

Have you ever felt so excited that you couldn't sleep? I did the night before our school trip. When the time arrived for us to mount the bus that would take us to Toronto I felt a little tired, but most of all hot. The day proved to be very warm as we travelled along Highway 401 to Toronto.

**Dear Stan Hall**  
When we arrived at the Parliament Buildings we were greeted by Mr. Stan Hall. As we entered the assembly room we admired the nine hundred pound chandeliers. Mr. Hall spoke to us about that room and many things about the opening of Parliament at the beginning of each session. Two of the most interesting things Mr. Hall mentioned were that of all the carvings around the room, no two were alike and a bird sat on either side of the speaker's chair. A guide took over and told us many things and answered our many questions about the assembly and the government. The Parliament Buildings were built in 1892 and took six years to build. The first parliament met here in 1892. Our member for Halton is Mr. Stanley Hall.

Debates in the assembly are recorded in Hansard by the clerk. Mr. Lewis and his assistant were called upon to sit in the clerk's seat and was asked a few

questions. One new law that I know of that has been made is that a driver's license will be issued to people of 18 years of age commencing sometime in September, 1962.

**Cooled at Castle**  
After this enjoyable visit we left for Casa Loma. The basement floor here cooled us off completely. A guide then showed us the different rooms. Sir Henry Pellatt built the castle from 1911 to 1914. Casa Loma has 98 rooms and the Kiwanis Club looks after it. I think the most beautiful room was the Conservatory. Each of the three doors leading into it cost \$10,000. Another attractive room was his study. This room was the smallest in the castle and had two secret panels. One of these led to the private bedroom and bathroom of Sir Henry, but the other led to his wine cellar and vaults. Sir Henry's bathroom was very elaborate because Henry wanted the best of everything and got it. This room was made of marble and even included a foot bath. Above the foot bath was a place for a telephone. In this way Sir Henry could speak to his guests in comfort. Mr. Pellatt had six taps in the shower and as the story goes, one was for hot one for cold and the other four were for different

and climbed up and down over 390 steps. We mounted the bus again which took us to High Park. There we had an enjoyable lunch. After lunch we left for the Museum. At the Museum our group visited the Mineralogy room which contained gems and minerals, and the geology room. We visited the Palaeontology room which contained bones of prehistoric animals, and the Curjelly Gallery which displayed suits of mail and armour.

**Never See Everything**  
In this whole trip I found Casa Loma very interesting, but when you've gone once you see just about everything. I think the Museum was the most interesting place because you never see anything and each different time you go there is something better and different to see.

**ORAL POLIO VACCINE**

Dr. Bull of Halton County Health Unit has announced the following clinics for the administration of Oral Polio Vaccine. Please check the schedule for your nearest school.

Sabin Oral Polio Vaccine has been used in large quantities in several countries and no harmful effects have been reported as resulting from its administration to any class of patient.

All age groups should receive this Vaccine whether or not they have been previously immunized with Salk Vaccine. Maximum immunity is obtained by the use of Salk Vaccine and the new Vaccine, and it is hoped that poliomyelitis can be eliminated entirely by the effective use of these two immunizing agents. Please urge your friends and neighbours to attend one of these schools. Adult clinics will be held from 7.00 to 9.00 p.m. at the schools indicated on the schedule. There will be no evening clinic of the High Schools.
