



### Pounding the SPORTS BEAT

WE WERE having a heat wave. The town was sweltering. That's the time they chose to open the Halton County Intermediate baseball season here Saturday.

And in what must have been one of the closest opening games in history, Acton went down to defeat at the hands of a ball club that is a big improvement over last year's Georgetown entry. It was only by a run less, but it made Duke Lindsay's collection of veterans and rookies feel bad. Georgetown was jubilant.

Bernie Dore, who never made much of a mark as a pitcher when he toiled here a couple of years back was the winner. Outside of the two Lawsons, Peter and Paul, none of the Acton players could do much with his fast ball.

Acton, meanwhile, took the wraps off a promising young right-hander when Bill Shannon was sent in, in relief of Bob Brattain, who so far has not replaced his 1961 form. Reliable Howie Cain also made a brief appearance.

**WHO DOES** Duke have in an Acton uniform this season? Most of the club are returnees from last year's team who played about 500 ball. Some new faces are in evidence, however, including two or three faces down from Guelph Seniors.

It looks like the Merchants are also going to rely on the four juniors who play with Guelph Anthems. The quartet didn't look out of place in Saturday's opener. At least two of the veterans, Bob Bruce and John Cunningham, have retired for the time being but it wouldn't surprise anyone if they were back in the lineup before very long.

Next game is here Saturday afternoon when Milton Red Sox invade Acton for their first game of the season. Game time 2:30.

**CAMPBELLVILLE** Merchants 1961 Int A Majors champs resumed their perennial hold on first place in the Halton County Baseball Association's intermediate series by beating Dundas 13-7 in the league opener Saturday.

Meanwhile, Q.B.A. seniors—champions last season—were no match for the villagers who rapped out 12 hits including two home runs from the bats of Ken Moore and Stan Henderson.

Defense plus was hardly of championship caliber — nine errors being committed by the team; five of them by the Merchants. Harry Hamilton, curve balling right-hander, was given credit for the win. He got help from lefts Jack Roberts who buried the last four innings. Between them they allowed eight hits on a circuit break by Rowe.

With no games scheduled for Sunday, the Campbellville club is taking on Galt Terriers in the Senior Intercounty in an exhibition on the village ballpark.

Despite recent acquisitions of such stars as Murray Oliver, Boston Bruce forward, who is considered one of the top shortstops in the Intercounty, Galt will have their work cut out for them Sunday.

## Ints. Show Plenty of Hustle

Georgetown Cottons, with former Acton right-hander Bernie Dore twirling a seven-hitter, spoiled the unveiling of the 1962 Action Merchants Saturday afternoon by shading them 65 in the Halton County Baseball Association's intermediate opener.

Only a sprinkling of fans turned out in the intense heat to witness what turned out to be a real thriller. Both teams played well, booting only three chances between them, and shoving surprisingly good condition.

**Three Runs in First**  
The game started out like it was going to be a typical opener — high scoring with the players all fingers and thumbs. However, after both teams plated three runs in the first inning, they settled down, sticking strictly to baseball.

Manager Duke Lindsay nominated lefty Bob Brattain to start on the hill for Acton. He pitched three innings, allowing six hits and five runs before he was lifted in favor of Bill Shannon, in his first year of intermediate ball.

Shannon shackled the Georgetown bats, allowing only two scratch singles and a double in his six inning stint on the mound. Unfortunately, a wild throw to first from short set up the winning run for the Cottons and pitched Bernie Dore came through with a timely single down the third base line to score the runner from second on the top of the eighth.

#### Rebounded

This was after the Merchants rebounded from a 5-3 deficit, knotting the count at 55 in the bottom of the seventh. Howie Cain also made a brief appearance on the slab for Acton, pitching to the last three batters in the ninth.

Paul Lawson's big bat, silent most of last season, broke out with a vengeance in the first inning for the Action club. Behind 30 on the strength of four scratch singles and a base on balls by the Cottons, Paul smashed a pitch to the softball screen in deep left centre, scoring Red

Anderson and Brian McCrabb ahead of him. Both Red and Brian had been issued free passes by a jittery Dore. When Pete Lawson's hard hit ball went into the hole between short and third, higher Paul scored to tie the count.

Georgetown went ahead again

in the third when a walk to Rich and a double clouted by McLaughlin was thrown around, allowing both runners to score.

**Tremendous Triple**  
Behind 53, Paul Lawson piled his second tremendous triple of the afternoon in almost the identical spot of his first in deep centre, scoring Brian McCrabb ahead of him and making it 54. McCrabb had made it to the bases with a near hit.

While Bill Shannon's assignment was puzzling, Georgetown, the Action club whittled down the lead in the seventh. Pete Lawson's single over short scoring brother Paul. But, quick Cotton infield action killed off promising Action rallies with double plays.

The turning point of the game was probably in the bottom of the seventh when McLaughlin, Georgetown's lanky shortstop, leaped high for a big hop and set up the double play.

**Won in Eighth**
