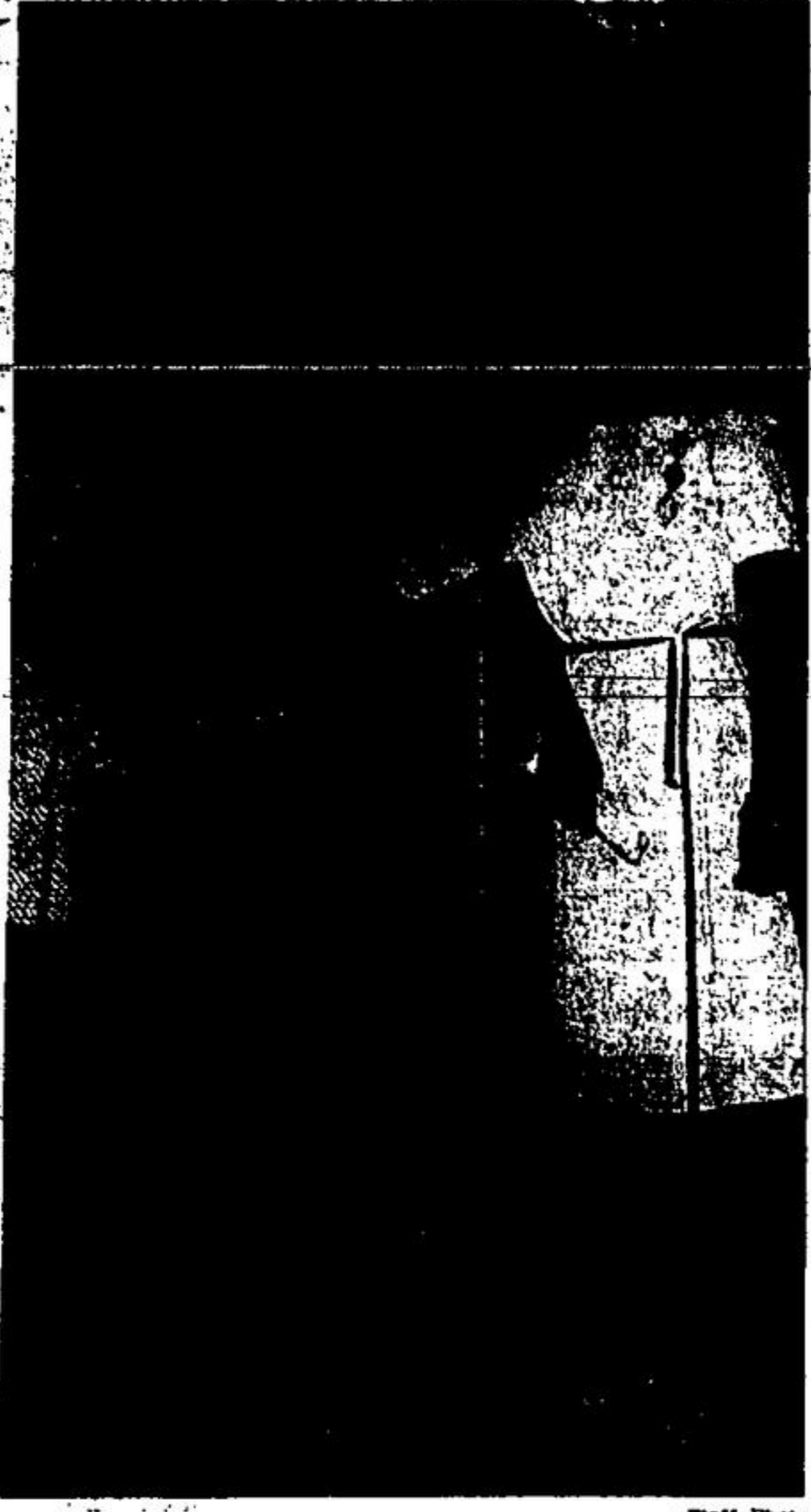
The C.W.L. held a rummage sale in St. Joseph's parish hall Friday.
