—The Georgetown Girls' Pipe Band, which paraded here on Decoration Day, won first prize in the Lions club parade in Hamilton the weekend before.

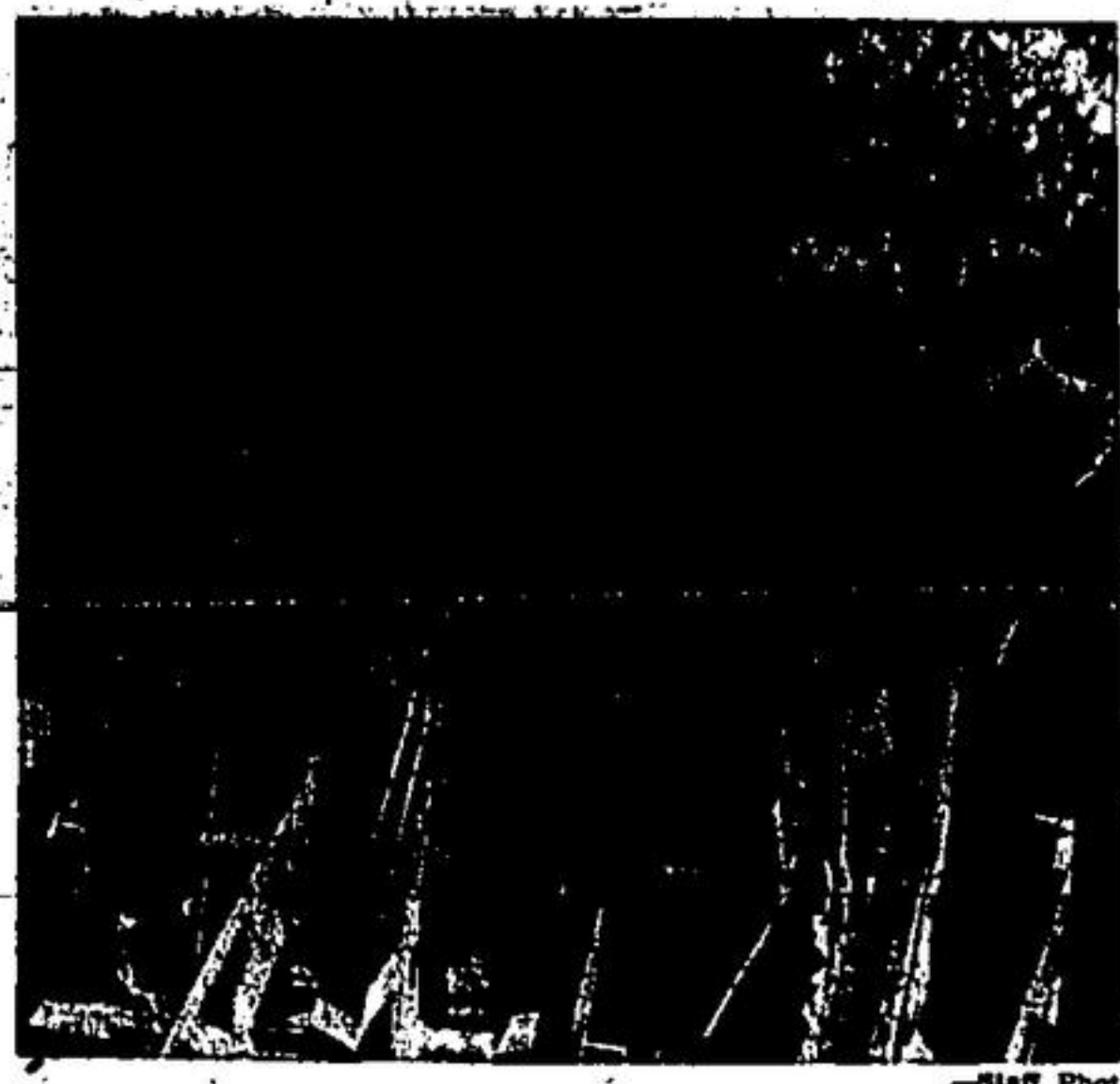
—The Rangers are planning a Strawberry social.

#### Time for Economic Planning Writer Cites NDP's Plan

After reading a letter signed by "A Liberal" and also the letter by another liberal supporter the previous week, I was rather amused with your little plug for the conservative candidate at your liberal readers' expense.

Is the P.C. candidate so lacking in personal qualifications that he has to rely on the past glories of his ancestors? If not, perhaps you would serve your cause better by comparing Mr. Best's achievements and qualifications with those of his opponents Mr. Rouleau and Dr. Harley and Mr. Wilson.

As to the Arrow issue, I am sure that the people of this county know where Mr. Best stood in this tragedy. Not only did he not comment on the issue but he did not have the decency to apologize to his bewildered Avro Conservative followers, after his party broke the promises he gave them, when soliciting their votes.

As an Avro employee and an ex Arrow Technician, I do not think that any good can be done debating the pros and cons of the Arrow. One thing is certain that the excuse that the Government gave for the cancellation will not stand up today, (i.e. too costly and obsolete), as they have spent, in the past four years over \$600,000,000 in procuring obsolete American designed aircraft for the defence of Canada. The issue I feel at the moment is to get down to the basic reason for the Malton tragedy.

In this respect the Liberal party must also accept their share of the blame for the lack of proper economic planning. With proper planning, this Avro plant, now operating at less than 20% of its capacity, could be turning out commercial air liners for use by our Canadian Airlines. The facilities and the technical know-how was there. Most of this staff is now south of the border, designing and servicing the spaceships of tomorrow. Under the present economic setup, we not only export our raw materials but also our

brains. I am sure our American friends will be pleased to hear Mr. Best's announcement that the Government is spending \$4,000,000 on technical training in Halton.

I feel that the time has now come for proper economic planning in order to avoid another Malton and Woolcombing tragedy and to eliminate the shame of having 7.4% of our working force unemployed.

The only party offering a sound plan in this election is the New Democratic Party, represented in this county by Mr. C. Rouleau.
