How to Elect Our Government

and name a candidate, aloud and in public. During this early period, the secret ballot was not yet in common use and elections were extended over several weeks, permitting the results of the open voting in one part of the country to influence those areas which voted later. In 1874, legislation was passed which abolished public nominations, instituted voting by secret ballot, and provided, with some exceptions, for elementary representatives, and the voters in each of the 263 constituencies (two of which — Queen's, P.E.I. and Halifax, N.S. — each send two members to the House of Commons), will elect a total of 265 members. By so doing, they are voting not only directly for their own member, but indirectly for the prime minister and cabinet.

Two Free Days
All electioneering must end two days before election day. This year, close to 10,000,000 Canadians will be given the opportunity to choose the nation's parliamentary representatives, and the voters in each of the 263 constituencies (two of which — Queen's, P.E.I. and Halifax, N.S. — each send two members to the House of Commons), will elect a total of 265 members. By so doing, they are voting not only directly for their own member, but indirectly for the prime minister and cabinet.

Have A Party
Another step, not required by law but which for obvious reasons is usually taken by the candidate, is to secure the support of a political party. Although this has no legal effect, it is politically practical to have the assistance and support of enthusiastic and numerous party workers.

Nowadays, the most popular method of choosing a political candidate is by nominating convention, attended by local party supporters chosen as delegates for the purpose. However, other methods used by political parties include the choice of a candidate by the executive of the local party riding association, or by a party meeting at which any elector may vote. It is expected that nearly 1,000 candidates will be nominated this year by June 4, when nominations closed.

For those who dream of a summer cottage on the shore of some lake or river in Ontario, there are 4,413 subdivided parcels on Crown summer resort subdivisions still available, as of May 15, 19 of the province's 22 forest districts. The lots are surveyed, all are fronting on water and all are accessible by road or water. Some lots are on small islands and all are ready for building.

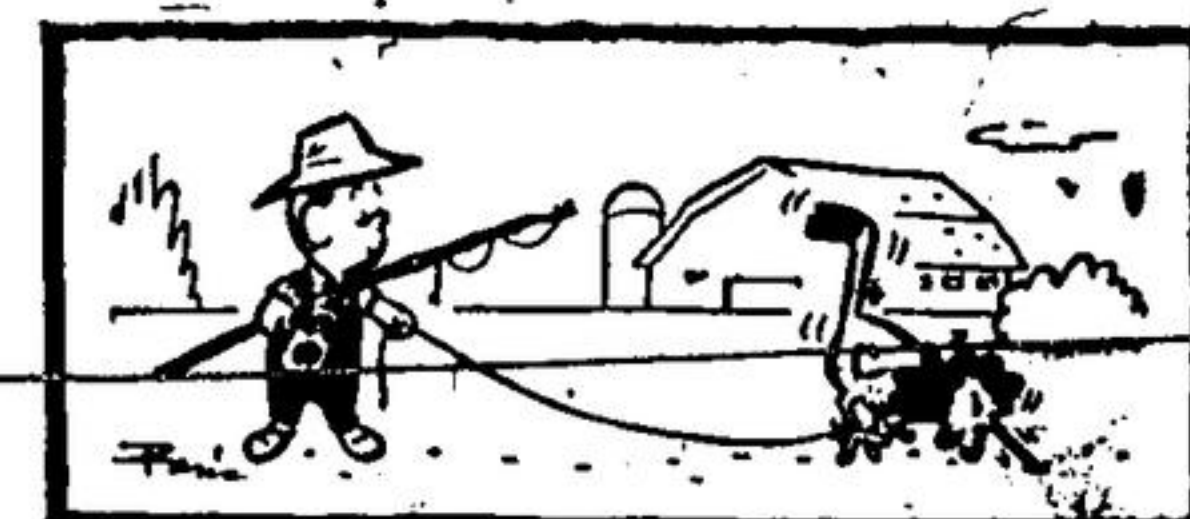
