Gerry Lynch, a spokesman for the plan, said that the Acton Community Health Plan would probably be the most successful enrolment of this type and further stated that this was mainly due to the large number of Acton residents already participating in the plan.

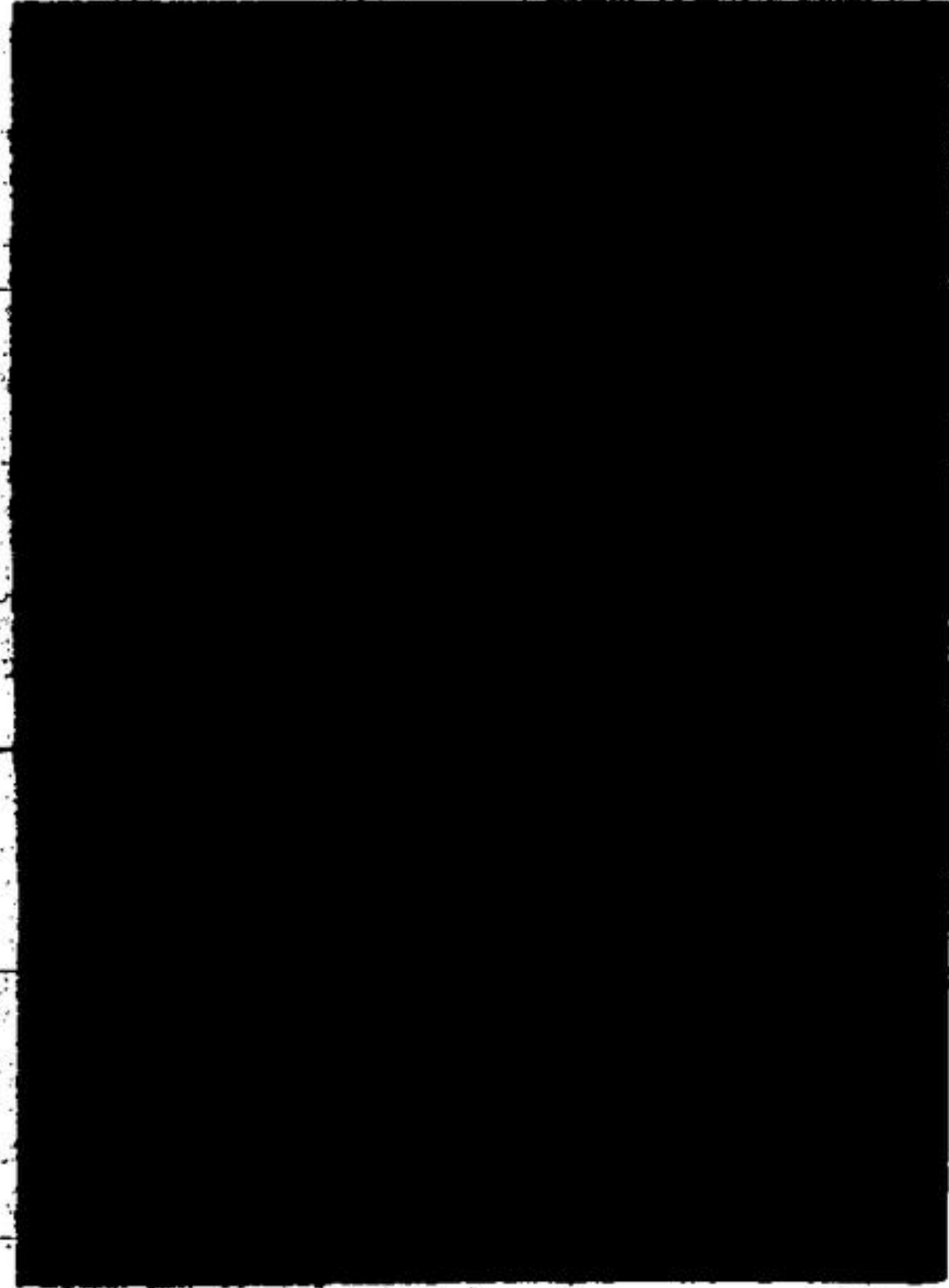
