The Education Committee of the North Halton Association for Retarded Children met with parents and friends recently to outline the work in North Halton.

Mrs. V. Kennedy, chairman, opened the meeting with words of welcome and a brief outline of the purpose of the meeting. It was noted that 11 parents were present. Mrs. Kennedy introduced guests and members of the North Halton Association and explained their activities in the Association, urging the parents to feel free to ask questions and voice any opinions.

Home Care Centre

Mrs. S. H. Howard, Home Care chairman, reported her committee is trying to establish an emergency home care centre so anyone can find immediate help should the need arise. Plans are being made for a baby-sitting service, which will be made available to the parents of retarded children. Parents were advised to consider plans for their child's future.

Mrs. R. P. E. Jeffares, principal of the school, informed the group of events of the near future. The children are putting on a concert in Acton on June 19; on June 20 the children and their parents are invited to a picnic at the Pony Ranch of Mrs. Terrior, Milton; and on June 23 the Opticists Club of Burlington have made arrangements for a fun fair to be open to retarded children and their parents. Six children are to attend summer camp at Camp Avr from August 11 to September 1.

Books Reviewed

Mrs. Jeffares advised that four books of interest to parents were available at Milton Library and also gave a brief review of six books owned by the school and which are also available to the parents.

Discussion followed with the parents asking questions concerning institutional care for their children.

L. L. McNeal, school inspector, explained that the Department of Education had made no change regarding the regulation governing children being admitted to school for a full day before the age 12. He outlined the duties of the admission board and commended Dr. Bull, Medical Officer of Health and health unit for their co-operation. Mrs. Jeffares, Mrs. Mitchell and Mrs. Hill, all teachers at the school, displayed the children's work and discussed the progress of each child with his parents.

G. G. Addison, president, outlined the formation of the North Halton Association for Retarded Children. He appealed to parents for more parental support. He asked the parents to feel free to call any member of the Association for advice and guidance.

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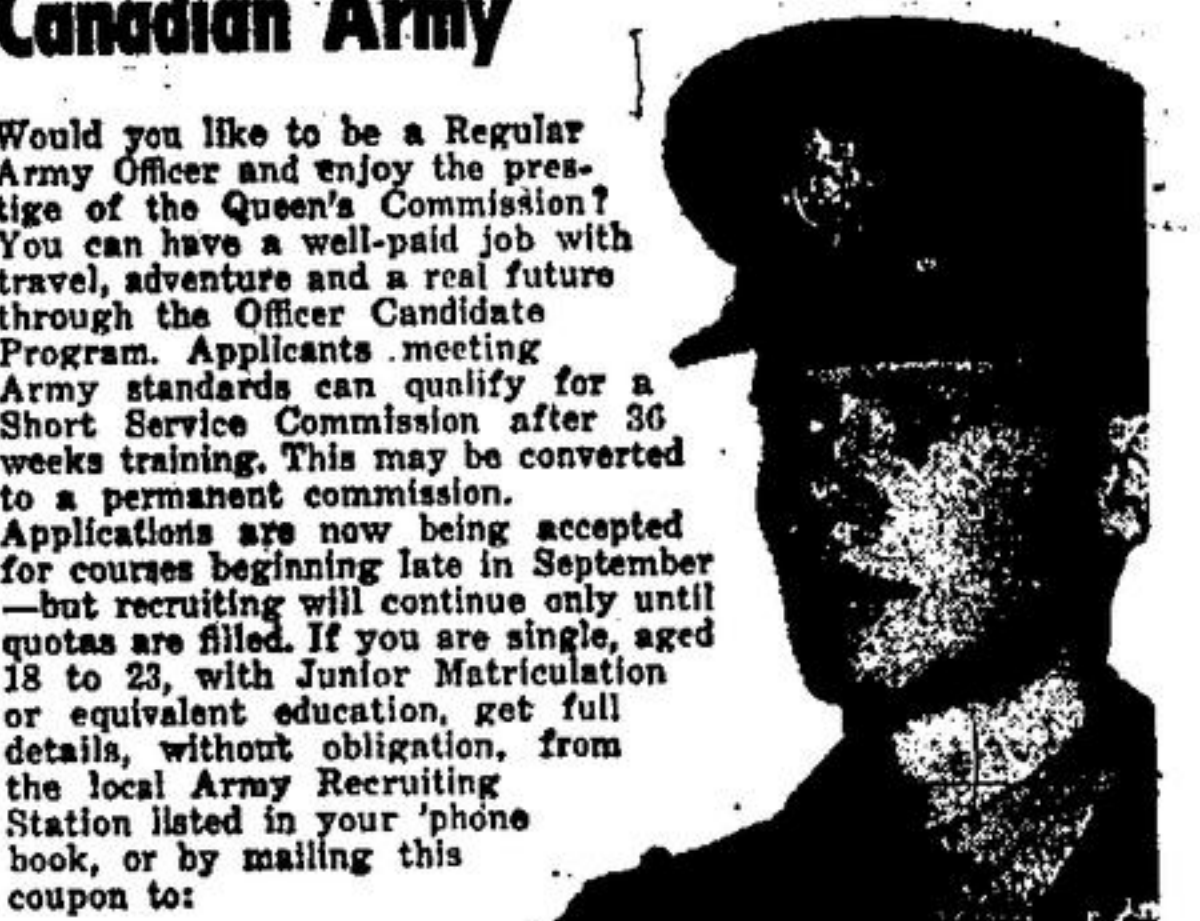
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LOST CAUSE
