Lakeside Chapter Meeting on Tuesday

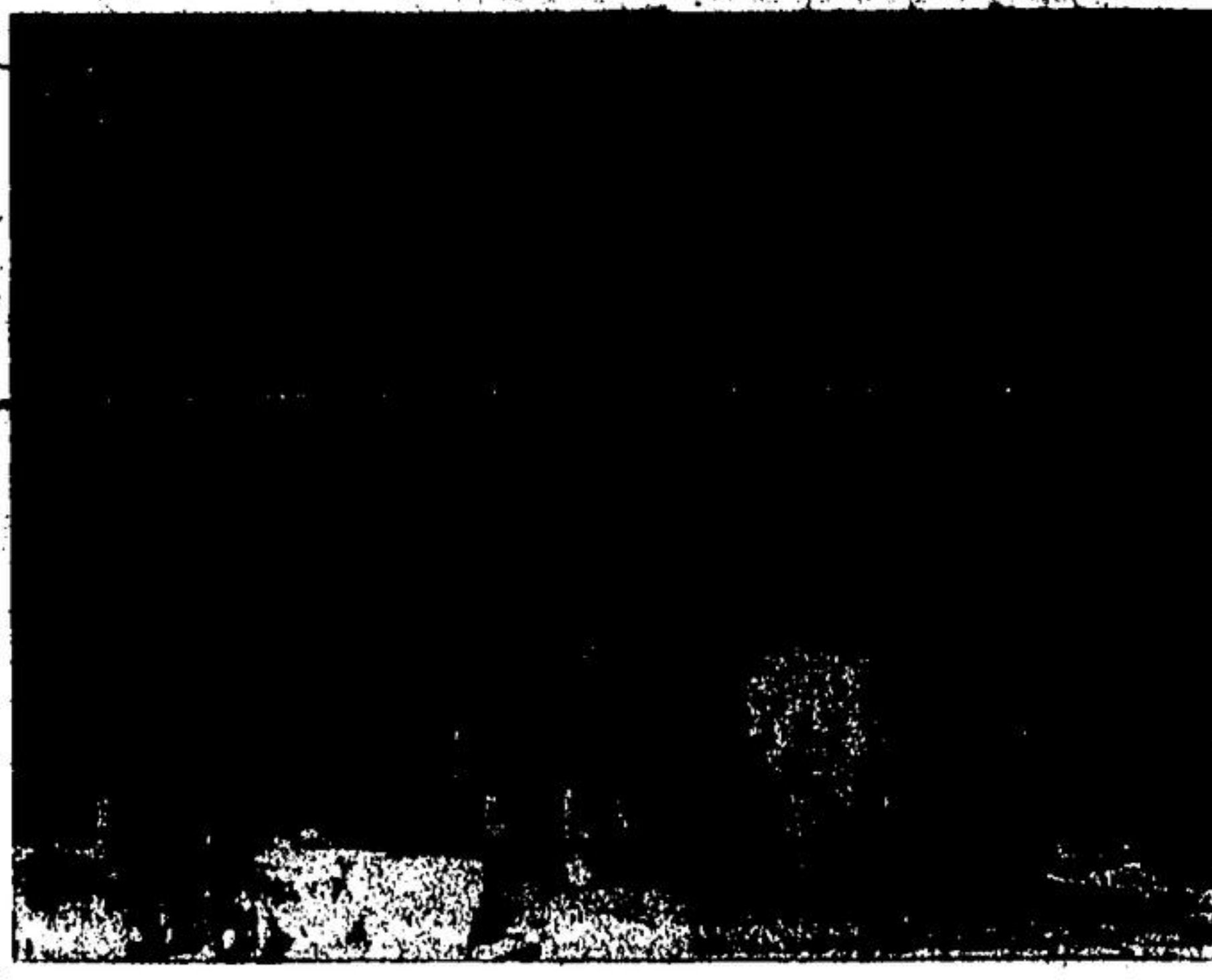
