(Continued from Page One) three of us men immediately took off for the water and started hunting for a girl who was reported by the man in the clothes to be drowning.

A young swimmer identified later as James Taylor of Grimsby located the girl and as he surfaced with her, he flipped her on her back, grabbed her hair and began swimming toward shore. We then helped him to carry her.

After Ken and I settled the girl's blue-colored body on shore I hollered to Roy Arnott (park caretaker) to call a doctor and get some blankets. He responded immediately and ran and got blankets while Jim Pope ran to call firemen and a doctor. Mr. Arnott did a terrific job in keeping the crowd back so Ken and I could apply artificial respiration. Brian Ruddy, the lifeguard, held the girl's head while I placed her arms in position and prevented her from swallowing her tongue. Ken applied artificial respiration. The girl's body was dark blue, veins were showing up in her face and her tongue was swollen up. I couldn't feel a pulse or a heartbeat. The young girl was breathing on her own when firemen and the doctor arrived.

The people sitting on shore must have thought there was a prank going on or something as they sat and laughed when the man fully clothed who was identified later as Jerome Cudney, cousin of the drowning girl, hollered for help. He did a brave thing going after his cousin as I understand he is not a particularly strong swimmer but even so fully clothed a person is hampered.

At the time of the incident I kept calm but after it was all over I began to realize how close a shave it was.

County Council Briefs

***A grant of \$4,300 was authorized for the North Halton Association for Retarded Children's new Sunshine School at Hornby, a \$40,000 structure.**

***At the June meeting of Halton County Council on Tuesday:**

***Members approved the design for the diaries in the new county building, submitted by Mrs. Elizabeth Hovey of Mollat. The design incorporates a picture of the present county building, erected in 1853, as well as an illustration of the county crest, both framed in Oak leaves. The diaries will be used for the council chambers, lounge rooms and judge's chambers.**

***Council granted permission to architect S. A. Armstrong to make changes in the window headers at the county building. Cost of making the change to the '05 windows was an estimated \$2,466.**

***Reeve C. A. Martin of Milton announced that \$110,000 of county debentures would soon go on sale locally. The treasurer is preparing a subscription list of persons interested in the debentures, so that future sales can be made easier. The offer will be advertised in the county newspapers.**

Jerome caught hold of Elizabeth and brought her to the surface but she struggled and he had to let go his hold again. He then began to shout for help and said to assist. I was helped to the shore by some man and told to sit down and take it easy.

Soon Elizabeth was brought to shore and men began to apply artificial respiration. When the men arrived with some machine to give her oxygen, Elizabeth began to scream and kick. Then I was told to get around her right side. Elizabeth was carried on a stretcher to a doctor's car and then put in Jerome's car for the trip home.

Peal told council Parks Board had requested a sign designating Acton Park and Community Centre. He stated when permission was obtained from the Department of Highways the sign would be installed on Main Street.

Reeve Jack Hargrave in reporting for the assessment committee told council the clerk was attempting to arrange an interview with a prospective assessor for the town but to date his committee had been unable to obtain an assessor.

Other committee reports were limited to reading accounts.

Sprinkler System

Council approved installation of a sprinkler system by Grenell and Company in the Community Centre building but stipulated a 500 gallon per minute booster pump be eliminated. This pump will not be necessary when the water pressure is increased by the new water reservoir being installed.

Acting clerk Joe T. Hurst presented councillors with the new County Industrial Committee brochure and briefly outlined details of its contents. Council acknowledged their appreciation of the work and efforts of the committee.

Accounts totalling \$7,153.42 were approved for payment.
