2,500 Attend Lions Carnival Win Lucky Prizes, Enjoy Fun

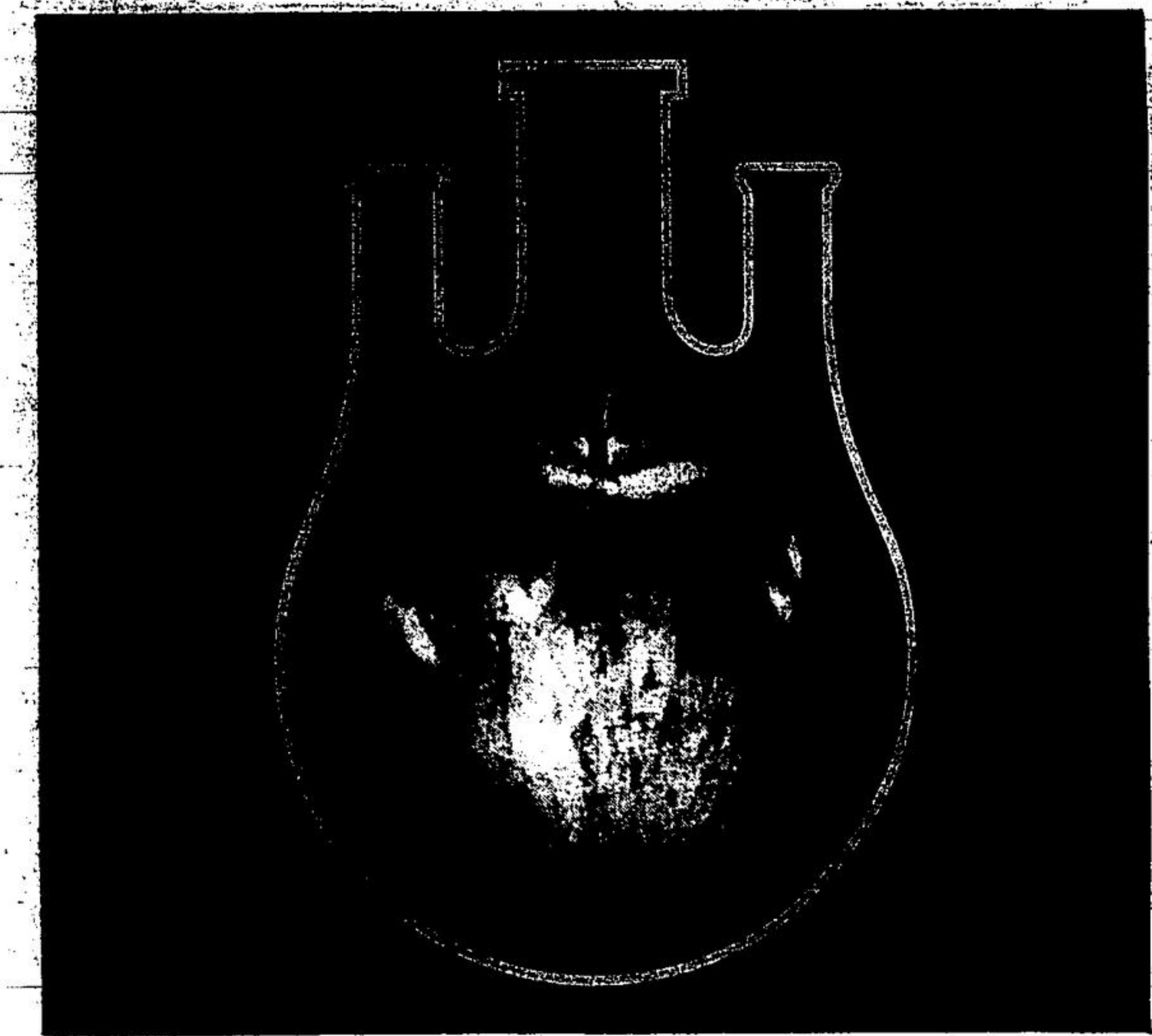

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Conform to Rules

Esquering Okays Abbatoir

Permission was granted Alois Niellispach to erect a \$16,500 abattoir on the Seventh Line between Stewarttown and Hornby, when Esquering Township Council met Monday, June 4.

Council noted there were no apparent objections about a similar abattoir at Hornby, but demanded the building conform to Health Department regulations and be set back 600 feet from the road and 1,000 feet from the nearest residence. The owner reported a well has been drilled and tested, and he plans to do custom killing of about eight steers and 25 hogs a week. Future plans call for a retail outlet on the front of the building.

Ontario Municipal Board approval of the township debenture for a new township hall has been held up, it was learned, pending receipt of proof of financing.

Council granted a building permit to Harold Powis, Milton, who is erecting a \$45,000 motel and snack bar on Highway 25 near Five Sideroad.
