Georgetown Protests County Equalization

Georgetown council will officially protest the Halton County equalization by-law — the by-law which allows the county to levy taxes against local municipalities based on their assessments.

Reeve John Elliot and Deputy-Reeve William Hunter reported to county council Tuesday that their council would definitely launch an appeal. The appeal is based on county assessor Ford Rogers' ruling that an additional \$459,899 was to be added to the Georgetown assessor's total of residential, commercial and industrial assessment, a three per cent increase.

Partial Review
In his annual equalization report to council, Mr. Rogers pointed out Acton, Milton, Esquating and Nassagaweya had adopted the Department of Municipal Affairs manual for assessing this year, and each municipality had added a substantial amount to their total assessment. Burlington and Oakville were assessed on the DMA manual previously. Georgetown, although it did not adopt the provincial manual, did make a partial review of assessments resulting in an increase on
