**Farm is Wonderful Place to Live If it's Safe, Says Chamber Speaker**

A well attended second annual Agricultural dinner meeting was held at the Station Hotel last Thursday evening when 15 district farmers were guests of the local members of the Chamber of Commerce and enjoyed a talk on farm safety by Halton county agricultural representative Al Francis.

In welcoming the rural guests, president Bert Hinton remarked, "It is a pleasure to toast our agricultural friends and neighbors on this special occasion and we hope that the continuation of these annual get-togethers will prove effective in developing closer harmony between farm and town."

Deputy Reeve Bill Denny, speaking on behalf of Mayor John Goy and Acton Council, also welcomed the guests of the evening and commented on the splendid community spirit evidenced by the Acton Chamber of Commerce and the rural agriculturalists.

Secretary Murray Harrison read a letter of appreciation from Miss Madeline Gibbons, named Citizen of the Year at the Chamber's last meeting.

**Get Back Dues**  
Membership committee chairman Rev. A. McKenzie advised the members that a campaign to collect back dues would be put into effect during the summer by his committee.

Phil Unger introduced Hank Borens as a recent member to join the Chamber of Commerce.

President Bert Hinton then turned over the meeting to Nino Braida chairman of the Chamber's agricultural committee, to chair the remainder of the evening's program.

**Best-Fed Nation**  
Mr. Braida, in his opening remarks, said he was pleased that the chamber set aside a special night to honor agriculture. "Canada is looked upon as the best fed nation in the world today. But Canadians tend to forget who is responsible for the food that comes to our tables. It is a most fitting gesture indeed that we should gather here tonight to honor the farmer," remarked the chairman of the agricultural committee.

Members of the Chamber of Commerce were asked to individually introduce their guest of the evening. Following the introduction of guests, Mr. Braida presented the members of his committee as Dave Manes, Glen White and Doug Rogers.

Mr. Francis, Halton county agricultural representative, guest speaker of the evening, was introduced by Dave Manes.

**Wonderful - If Safe**  
Mr. Francis gave a most interesting and informative talk on Farm Safety. The Halton county agricultural representative, who is also the president of Milton Rotary Club, immediately captured the attention of his rural and urban audience and continued to hold their interest throughout his dynamic presentation on farm accidents based on the findings of a recent survey across Ontario.

Mr. Francis told his audience that "the farm is a wonderful place on which to work and live if you are around long enough to enjoy it." He reported that Farm Safety, along with farm Business Management and 4-H Club projects, are rated priority programs by the extension branch of the Department of Agriculture.

**Hazards in Kitchen**  
Results of a 12 month survey revealed 1,509 accidents in and about the home, of which 63 resulted in permanent injury and 31 in death. The kitchen appears to be the most hazardous room in the home with stairs, bathrooms and cellars, also taking their toll. In the home, most accidents occur in the morning, with 84 accidents happening between 10 a.m. and noon.

The Ontario Farm Accident Survey also revealed that farm fields, including bush, orchards, lanes and ponds, are dangerous to farm persons. The most dangerous area on the farm appeared to be in and around the barn and stables, the scene of 2,290 accidents resulting in 32 fatalities. Of these, the barn, stables and the barnyard provided the heaviest concentration. Traffic accidents totalled 1,701, resulting in 151 fatalities, of approximately one-half of all lives lost!

**Long-Range Program**  
Mr. Francis concluded by listing points in a long-range safety program to prevent farming accidents and to cope with unavoidable mishaps. Organization of district groups, such as Halton's 10-member Safety Committee, was one important step, plus promotion of first aid training under St. John Ambulance guidance; and community meetings of the kind sponsored by the Acton Chamber of Commerce on Thursday evening.

One of the most recent suggestions to be supported by the extension branch and considered a major project is the installation of red flags on slow moving farm vehicles on the highway, the Halton county agricultural representative reported.

Glen White thanked the speaker on behalf of the Chamber of Commerce and the agriculture committee. Former warden Gen. Wallace, in his thanks to Mr. Francis on behalf of the rural guests, noted that a gathering such as this was one of the best ways to foster good public relations between urban and rural communities.

President Bert Hinton expressed his thanks and said that he was already looking forward to the next annual Agricultural Night and sincerely hoped that it would be as enjoyable and interesting as the one just concluded.

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**CHANGES IN DEMERIT POINT SYSTEM**

Ontario Department of Transport announces changes in Demerit Point System effective July 1st, 1962.

The Point System has been changed to encourage better driving habits and to correct dangerous drivers by strengthening the demerit point scale. The changes are designed to save lives—including yours.

**NEW DEMERIT POINT SCALE**

Points:	Violation:
7	Failing to remain at scene of accident
6	Careless driving
6	Racing
6	Exceeding speed limit by 30 m.p.h. or more
5	Failure of driver of bus to stop at railway crossing.
4	Exceeding speed limit by more than 19 m.p.h. and less than 30 m.p.h.
4	Failing to stop for schoolbus.
4	Following too closely.
3	Exceeding speed limit by more than 10 m.p.h. and less than 20 m.p.h.
3	Driving under, through or round a railway crossing barrier.
3	Failing to obey the directions of a police constable.
3	Overcrowding driver's seat.
3	Improper passing.
3	Driving wrong way on one-way street.
3	Driving wrong way on a divided highway.
3	Failing to yield right-of-way.
3	Failing to obey stop sign, signal light or railway crossing signal.
3	Failing to report an accident.
2	Failing to lower headlamp beams.
2	Making U-turns where prohibited.
2	Making turns where prohibited.
2	Towing of persons on toboggans, bicycles, skis etc.
2	Failing to obey signs.
2	Pedestrian crossover violations.
2	Failing to share road.
2	Improper right and left turns.
2	Failing to give signals.
2	Unnecessary slow driving.
2	Improper opening of vehicle door.

Upon conviction, points are recorded against the driver for the offences listed in the Point System Scale. Demerit points remain on a driver's record for a period of two years after the date of conviction.

**At 6 points:** The driver is informed of his record and urged to exercise greater care.

**At 9 points:** The driver is required to attend a personal interview to discuss his record and give reasons why his licence should not be suspended.

**At 15 points:** Accumulated within a 2-year period—the driver's licence is suspended and retained in the Department for one month.

At the conclusion of a period of suspension—the number of points on the driver's record is reduced to 7. Until the driver has cleared his record, a further accumulation of 15 points within a 2-year period will result in suspension for six months.
