MACHINERY OPERATION

DO

1. Attach P.T.O. shields EVEN FOR SHORT JOBS.
2. Shut off P.T.O. BEFORE LEAVING THE TRACTOR SEAT.
3. Be careful ON THE HIGHWAY with farm machinery.
4. Attach RED warning signals at the rear.
5. STOP the pulley BEFORE removing the belt.
6. Keep ALL guards in place.
7. Use common sense.

DON'T

1. Leave the P.T.O. shield IN THE DRIVESHEED.
2. Wear RAGGED OR SLOPPY CLOTHING around machinery.
3. Be a "ROAD-HOG" with slow moving equipment.
4. Leave on the WHITE working light for highway travel.
5. RIDE ON THE DRAW BAR to adjust levers.
6. Stand IN FRONT of a mower or combine cutterbar.
7. Take chances on YOUR life.

TRACTOR OPERATION

1. A tractor has but one seat. NEVER carry passengers.
2. ALWAYS attach the P.T.O. shield.
3. Stop the P.T.O. BEFORE dismounting.
4. Never refuel while the engine is RUNNING or HOT.
5. Always operate at SAFE SPEEDS.
6. Keep the tractor in gear on down grades.
7. Be extra careful with a tractor on PUBLIC ROADS.
8. Remember. The OPERATOR, not the tractor, is the main cause of accidents.

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Doctors' Situation Reviewed in Letter

One of Acton's doctors passed on to the Free Press a letter he received from the Ontario Medical Association, which reads in part:

"The Council of the O.M.A. at Windsor in May 1962 adopted the following resolution:

"Whereas the Saskatchewan Medical Care Act and the amendments thereto impose compulsion to the point of civil conscription on both subscriber and doctor, and

"Whereas the same precepts are capable of preventing the doctors in Saskatchewan from practicing medicine outside an act of which they disapprove,

"Therefore be it resolved that this council of the Ontario Medical Association unreservedly endorses the actions of the doctors in Saskatchewan which are designed to protect professional and individual freedom.

The letter goes on: "Since the time the Medical Care Act has been implemented and the doctors have closed their offices, it is noteworthy that the Saskatchewan press, which it must be presumed understands the whole background, is mainly in support of the doctors' stand. The Act and its amendments, together with the events which led up to its implementation, have left doctors of the province with no option but either to work under the Act, to leave the province, or to do what they have actually done. Leaving the province would have left the people of Saskatchewan without medical care, so the doctors have closed their offices and provided free essential medical services under an emergency plan.

"This is not a plan just to deal with emergencies, and it was the only method by which the doctors could give essential care without the Medical Care Act becoming effective."



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
