

Kelso Dam Regulations Approved By Authority

A four-page list of regulations covering the 16 Mile Creek Conservation Authority's conservation park at the Kelso Dam, received approval by the authority last week.

Absolutely prohibited are defacing, damaging or removing any property, soil, rock, shrub, tree, plant or flower; hunting animals and birds; explosives fireworks and firearms; abandoning refuse, except in the pits provided; entering the park before 10 a.m. and staying later than sunset; wading, bathing or swimming outside the times set by the authority; use of a snorkel or underwater breathing apparatus, and out-

Rotary Budget

At the Rotary business meeting Tuesday the budget was made up and committees arranged. There were visitors from Milton and Guelph with Ron Lewis presiding in the president's absence.

Other regulations state a permit must be obtained for posting signs or bills, bringing animals into the park, selling or advertising, holding entertainments, or public meetings, begging or soliciting charity, or lighting a fire. Campers are being discouraged this year, but when they are allowed, it will only be allowed by permit.

The rules state a speed limit of 30 m.p.h. applies on vehicles. No commercial vehicles are allowed. Fees for car parking were set at 50 cents per car or motor cycle or \$3 for this year, with the bus fee set at \$5 per day. Parking fees started on Saturday, July 21.

Lid on Last Lap

Final stage has been reached for the restoration of the digester lid at the disposal plant which has been out of commission since April 9. Bill Assneck, welding contractor from Markham, received the contract for rebuilding the lid and J. B. Mackenzie and Sons are completing the installation and sewer chairman J. Bert Wood stated this week he hoped the lid will be back in place on the digester plant some time next week. Heavy crane equipment will be brought in to set the 12-ton lid in place.

C.A. Short of Money

Immediate construction of an approved work will cost an estimated \$24,500 of the \$26,000 the Authority has left to spend on projects this year.

The members had hoped to complete the change house and also erect a gatehouse at the entrance to the park, but found when tenders on the complete project were opened that the project would cost an estimated \$57,000.

Complete Part of Kelso Project

Harold White Construction of Oakville was awarded a \$15,000 tender on roughing in the walls, roof and piping at the change house, to give bathers some shelter this year. It is hoped the building can be equipped with showers and toilets next year. The gatehouse is to be erected this winter as an Authority project under the winter works program, at a probable cost of \$4,000.

W. B. Hamilton Construction will erect the 18 inch deep wading pool, and pour the concrete slabs around the already completed swimming pool at a cost of \$7,500. Parking lots and fencing will be done by Authority staff at a cost not to exceed \$2,000. A footbridge across the creek to the wading and swimming pools was not considered, when estimates

At County Council

Acton Protests Grant System Hospitals Don't Benefit Us

Plans of Halton County Council to reduce to \$2,500 their present \$6,000 per bed grant for construction of hospitals in the county has upset the Halton Hospital Association.

Association president Paul Fisher of Burlington told county councillors Tuesday that the Association should be contacted before this "backward step" is taken.

Appearing with a large delegation representing the Hospital Association, Mr. Fisher reviewed the council's past grants of \$6,000 per bed for hospital construction in Milton, Georgetown, Oakville and Burlington. "It will be some years before any of these hospitals need additions, but the costs will surely go up, not down," he told council. "We don't know what the future construction costs or government grants will be. But the people expect you to continue to provide enough money to build the hospitals they will need."

Mr. Fisher asked councillors to remember that if the County Council didn't make a large enough contribution, it would fall on the separate municipalities to make up the difference.

Bruce MacNab of Milton reiterated the chairman's comments, and told county councillors they would have to accept more responsibility in the future. "If the county gets out it will be a very definite backward step down the ladder," he said.

Reeve C. A. Martin of Milton, speaking for county council, explained the proposed change in the hospital grants by-law was only a suggestion so far, and was far from complete. He explained the county was trying to keep abreast of modern developments, and pointing out that if a cobalt bomb centre were needed in one of the hospitals, the county would pay for it even if it meant forgoing some road construction.

The change in the by-law, he said, was to put the county in a position where they could give what they feel they could afford in light of the present financial situation.

In the midst of the discussion a letter from Acton council was read, pointing out Acton's contributions to other county hospitals -- through the county council grant system -- had brought no benefit to the town of Acton and probably wouldn't in future. The letter called for the rescinding of the by-law in its entirety.

Urging Guelph In his reply Mr. Fisher pointed out that many Acton and Nagsaweya residents use Guelph hospitals although county residents don't help Guelph pay for the hospital debentures. Warden Willard Bird noted, however, that this works two ways and many other residents from outside the county are taking advantage of Halton's hospital facilities.
