



# Merchants Wallop Cottons 19-11

## MINOR SPORTS

Another powerful attack with lumber on two pitchers earned Action Merchants a convincing 19-11 victory over Georgetown Cottons on the local ballfield Saturday afternoon.

The win consolidated Action's fourth place position in the Halton County baseball intermediate series and dropped Georgetown to fifth.

Both clubs nominated see no one to start the game. McLaren took the slab for Georgetown while southpaw Bob Brattain got the starting assignment for the Merchants.

### Brattain Wins

At game's end McLaren was still around as was Brattain. From the two visiting hurlers the Action club collected 18 hits including a home run from the big bat of Pete Lawson.

Despite all the runs scored 43 in the last three games, the Merchants won only one of the three. They lost the other two by one solitary run in each instance.

They're beginning to look like one of the best ball clubs to come out of Acton in some time. A little weak defensively, perhaps, but improving in that department as well.
