## Firemen Land at League Top

Two convincing victories by Acton Firefighters this week established the bossmen as final league leaders and decided which teams would be playoff contenders in the Acton town league softball.

Their 107 win over Beardmore Farmers Thursday assured the firemen of at least a piece of first place. Tuesday they completely routed Junior Farmers fighting for a playoff position 13-0 and assured Dominion Hotel of fourth place and a berth in the playoffs. It also nailed down the flag for the firemen.

First playoff game is scheduled for Monday at 8:00. Bill Spivey on Spree Paced by the bat of Bill Spielvogel who lashed out three hits including a double in five appearances at the plate the firemen secured in every inning except the eighth and last in their 107 win over the Farmers.
