A fund-raising campaign is now being conducted, to raise the \$21,000 needed to build one. In previous verbal agreements, both councils promised to donate \$2,500 and half the maintenance costs.

Council also approved payment of \$1,017 to the Milton Fire Area Board for the 1962 levy, and promised Georgetown District High School Board to make a part payment on the year's high school levy by September 1.

Beardmore Head On Trade Mission

An eight-man trade mission headed by W. J. Beatty, president of Beardmore and Company left Milton Airport this morning (Thursday) on the first leg of their journey to Europe on a 24 day group effort to stimulate export trade in the leather industries.

Mr. Beatty, also president of the Tanners Association, is accompanied by G. F. Cossan of the A. R. Clark tannery; E. L. Owan, Gols Leather Company, Aurora; Bert Cook, Barrie Tanning Company; C. S. Riley, Dominion Tannery, Winnipeg; Charles Pagan, Ducloux-Fayon Tannery, Quebec; Fred W. Dowling, Labor representative from the United Packing House Workers of America; and W. L. Herman, Department of Trade and Commerce, who will be secretary to the trade mission.

After a briefing session in Ottawa the group will leave for London, England Friday. After a week in England they will visit Germany, Switzerland, France (where they will attend the International Leather show) and then return to Dublin, Ireland, before leaving for home again.
