

Stone School to House Grade 12-13 H.S. Students

Record enrolment, addition of an extra class and moving of grades 12 and 13 to the stone school are on the agenda for Tuesday at Acton high school.

Principal E. A. Hansen and his staff of teachers expect an enrolment of 400 students Tuesday. Last year, 365 students attended classes. Rural students being bused to school will be picked up at the same times and places as last year. Ted Tyler Sr. and Jr. will once again provide transportation. This was decided Wednesday evening.

A grade will be added this year to relieve crowding. Last spring there were over 40 in grade 12; this fall two smaller grade 12s will be created. Classes are a perfect pyramid — five grade nines, four grade 10s, three grade 11s, two grade 12s and one grade 13.

May Not Be Ready
Although contractors are doubtful the Stone School will be entirely completed by Tuesday. Grades 12 and 13 students will attend classes in their renovated quarters.

Waiting for parts is holding up the desks in the lab at the stone school. Carpentry and installing equipment still follow after plumbing is done.

The science setup in this new lab will be different with all the desks around the outside of the room. This will cut the cost of services and students will be able to see better. Piping and gas are already installed.

The former stone school library will be used for an office and there will be a library assistant. The classrooms will be located in the former commercial room and in two tavern upstairs.

Go Out for Gym
Grades 12 and 13 will stay in the stone school while the teachers shuttle between the two schools. The grade 12s will take physical education at the high school Monday and Wednesday afternoons.

The stone school classes are a

temporary arrangement to save off a high school addition. The Roberts plan for streamlining high school students begins this year in grade nine, and will progress through all the grades, one year at a time. Acton high school is only affected slightly; one grade nine class will not take French.

The high school has had its annual "summer housecleaning" which includes preparing the gym floor with a special solution which makes it look like "a skating rink."

Staff of 20
There is a staff of 20 with principal Mr. Hansen. Several are new.

Joseph Bray starts his teaching career here with grade 12 and 13 chemistry, grade 11 physics and grade nine science. An O.A.C. grad, he took pre-Med. at Mc

31,000 in Trek Back to School On Tuesday A.M.

School doors across Halton County re-open next Tuesday morning after a long summer holiday, and an estimated 31,000 students are expected to march right in and take a seat. This means that over one-quarter of the County's 115,000 population will be in school again next week.

Approximate figures on the probable enrolments for next term show Burlington leading with 12,500, Oakville next at 11,000, Georgetown 3,000, Milton 1,800, Acton 1,200, Esquesing 1,000 and Nassagaweya 400.

Of this total, nearly 22,000 are in public schools, while high schools expect to enroll 8,000. The remainder will attend R. C. separate school and retarded children's schools. Many more will be heading for universities outside the county later in the month.

New Three-Room Hornby School Opens Doors for "Sunshiners"

A new school, added enrollment and additional supervisory help are highlights of the pupils at the North-Hornby Sunshiner School can look forward to next Tuesday morning.

For the first time since the late '50s, the school will have a full-time teacher. He will live in Cooksville, where his wife, the former Mary Jane Joyce, teaches.

Vice principal Michael Bevan will take guidance counselling, grade 13 botany and zoology.

Tom Carter has shop and dress-making practice.

Bill Coates teaches mathematics and physics in grade 13 and grade nine math.

Miss June Conway will teach French in grades nine, 10 and 11.

Oscar Dwyer will teach grade nine, 10 and 11 math.

Miss Joan Lee will teach grade nine, 10, 12 and 13 history.

Mrs. Hazel Orr will teach home economics, in which she took a summer course, girls' health and will be in the library.

Mrs. Grace Rogers teaches grade 10 English and grade 11 history.

C. L. Rognvaldson will teach geography in grades 10, 11, 12 and 13. He took a summer course in shop and will be teaching at in grade 10.

Caretakers are again Rudolph Spilvogel and Ken McKinnon.

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
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
